The new national curriculum was published on 11th September 2013. Full details can be found here

- The majority of the existing national curriculum programmes of study, attainment targets and assessment arrangements have been disapplied and are not compulsory until September 2014. This applies to all subjects and year groups except English, Mathematics and Science for pupils in Years 1, 2, 5 and 6.
- With the exception of the core subjects in Years 1, 2, 5 and 6, during disapplication schools are free to develop their own methods of measuring pupil progress or continue to use level descriptors to assess pupils' progress if they believe this is the most effective means of assessing progress.
- The reformed GCSEs are being re-phased, with English and Mathematics being brought in for first teaching from 2015 and other subjects introduced in 2016. Click here for full details.
- The consultation on primary assessment and accountability (see MI Sheet 218/13) follows publication of the new national curriculum programmes of study, and the announcement that the current system of levels will be removed and not replaced. The consultation closes on Friday 11 October, 2013. Full details can be found here.

The national curriculum from September 2014 will be significantly different, and it has considerable implications for you and your school. The national curriculum forms part of the school curriculum. The school curriculum comprises all learning and other experiences that each school plans for its pupils.

Some questions to consider:

- Do you have a rationale for your curriculum which reflects your school's ethos and values and meets the needs of **your** pupils?
- How much of your current curriculum can remain unchanged? How much can be adapted? What might you have to introduce?
- How prepared are all of your staff to 'Contribute to the design and provision of an engaging curriculum' (Teaching Standard 4) with an increased choice of local curriculum content?
- Have you considered potential transition issues for 2013 2014:
 - Reception pupils moving from Early Learning Goals to Year 1
 - Pupils in Year 8 in 2013/14 who will be the first students to take the new GCSEs in English language, English literature and Mathematics?
- How will you plan to track the progress of all pupils, in light of '<u>Assessing</u> without levels'?
- What are the key CPD needs for your staff to secure successful implementation of the new curriculum over this academic year?
