CALL TO ARTISTS - CLEY14

NNEP annual exhibition at Cley next the Sea from 3 July-3 August 2014

CLEY14: A Creative Conversation - Curators Polly Binns and Rod Bugg

We are two artists who have been working together in an on-going creative conversation for the past 4 years. Our conversation was initiated by Barbara Dougan, the Suffolk artist and curator, and has developed through studio visits, showing together and working alongside each other on the North Norfolk coast, and through a joint residency at the Sidney Nolan Trust on the Welsh Borders. We also selected and curated the first biannual drawing exhibition at the One Church Street Gallery in Great Missenden. We now have been invited to select and curate Cley14. We would like the selection and curation of Cley14 to be an extension of this conversation, both visual and verbal, reflecting on key parts of our shared practice and the positioning of our thinking in relation to a wide range of contemporary practice. We see involvement with the artists leading up to the exhibition as an important element of Cley14. We hope to achieve this through selected studio visits and by creating a day for conversation. We hope to encourage artists to establish ways of sustaining their own/mutual conversations and will include a participating artists' evening/event during the exhibition. The rationale in selecting specific work will highlight the artists' ideas of 'A sustained conversation with materials'.

We will be seeking art practices which:

Exemplify a sustained conversation with materials

Embrace process and material substance

Explore the role of accident and intention

Investigate the conversation of materials and the particular experience of the physical opportunity of Cley14

Inhabit specific environments both intellectually and emotionally

Work with site and practice in tandem

With this theme in mind we anticipate work coming forward which looks at notions of minutiae and immensity, forms of archaeological investigation, drawing and making based on intimate, intellectual and emotional knowledge.

We would welcome submissions from all approaches to visual form and image, physical and time based. We would encourage proposals for new work as well as site specific and time based work. Collaborations would be welcome as would work of an ephemeral nature. We are also interested in the potential of 'pop-up' elements and interventions to extend the appeal of multiple visits to the exhibition and its locations in Cley.

We want to extend the conversation with the audience through the programme of events that runs parallel to the exhibition initiated by the NNEP committee.

New funding has been awarded for Cley14 for an educational project involving 4 Norfolk Schools, and selected artists are invited to participate in this. The details are yet to be finalised but it is likely to involve an artist visiting a school prior to the exhibition and then the school visiting the exhibition accompanied by the artist and the Curator/s. Arts Council England's £24 Million Small Capital Grants - Round 2 Open

Arts Council England's Small Capital Grants scheme is designed to benefit arts initiatives taking place in England, helping to make these projects more sustainable and resilient. The scheme forms part of a range of measures intended to help create a more sustainable, resilient and innovative arts sector. This programme represents a new approach to the way the Arts Council uses its capital funds, with investment focused on improving existing arts buildings to make them more economically and environmentally sustainable and to give arts organisations the right buildings and equipment to support the delivery of their work.

The scheme has a total budget of £24 million available for distribution. Under Round 2, which is now open to applications, individual organisations can apply for a capital grant of between £100,000 and £499,999. Eligible projects are those that require a range of capital expenditure. This could include, for example, improvements that enable organisations to reconfigure current spaces to generate more income, install sustainable technologies to reduce energy demand or to improve current facilities to enable improved delivery of their work for artists and audiences. Applications are invited from arts organisations operating across the private and third sectors in England. Those that deliver arts activities which can engage people or help artists to carry out their work will be targeted. **Deadline for the second round is by 10am on 19 Dec 2013.**

Clore Duffield Poetry & Literature Award Open to Applications

The Clore Poetry and Literature Awards is a £1 million initiative aimed at funding poetry and literature projects for young people across the UK over a five year period (2011-2015). The overall objective of the programme is to provide young people under the age of 19 with the opportunity to experience poetry, literature, and creative writing both inside and outside of school, in compelling and exciting forms. Grants ranging from £1,000 to £10,000 are available. Submissions for the sixth round of funding should be received no later than Friday, 7 March 2014 (5pm). Centre for Social Action Innovation Fund (UK)

Through the programme, charities, social enterprises, public services and for-profit businesses can apply for grants of between £50,000 and £500,000. While applicants can be established in any part of the UK, the benefits of their proposals should focus primarily or significantly on England. First Light Film Nation UK Outreach Grant Programme Launched (UK)

Grants of up to £10,000 are available to engage young people aged 14 to 19 years who are not in formal education in a project that combines watching, making and understanding of film. Funding is available for the following:

- Projects which provide filmmaking training, plus elements of watching and understanding film for at least 20 disadvantaged young people aged 14 to 19 years.
- Projects that match disadvantaged young people who are not in mainstream education with professional filmmakers with an extensive track record of working in film with disadvantaged young people.
- Projects that recognise film is a powerful tool for engaging disadvantaged young people and empower those young people to lead in all areas of the process and give them a voice.
- Projects that include substantial complementary watching and understanding activity such as a mini festival, screenings and master classes.
- Projects that result in the making of two short films that are up to five minutes duration each.

Constituted organisations with a registered office in the UK are eligible to apply, this includes limited companies, local authorities, schools and charities.

A maximum of 70 grant applications will be accepted. If the cap of 70 applications is not reached then the deadline for applications is 21 October 2013 (2pm).

Creative Employment Programme (England)
