## Norfolk Schools Survey for LGBT History Month - February 2014

We want to find out what language you hear or use in school. In particular we want to find out which words you think are ok to use to describe something or someone, and which words you think are offensive.

### Will anyone know they are my answers?

No - your answers to this survey are private. This means that we do not know your name and no one will know who said what. We do ask you to tell us some things about yourself, like whether you have a disability or whether you are a boy or a girl. If you reply that you are worried about your safety, we will need to let your school know about this, so they can make changes to help people like you. They still will not see your answers and will not know your name.

### What if I don't want to answer a question?

Just miss it out and move on to the next one. The only question we need an answer for is which school you go to.

### What if I don't want to answer any questions?

You don't have to do this questionnaire. If you don't want to, tell your teacher.

Bullying means people doing nasty or unkind things to you on purpose, more than once, which it is difficult to stop. It is different from when two friends of the same strength have the odd fall out or quarrel.

Homophobic bullying is bullying someone because they are gay, lesbian, or bi-sexual or because someone thinks they are gay, lesbian or bi-sexual.

Transphobic bullying stems from a hatred or fear of people who are transgender. 'Transgender' is as an umbrella term that describes people whose sense of their gender or gender identity is seen as being different to typical gender norms.

Different groups of people experience homophobic and transphobic bullying:

- Young people who are lesbian, gay, bi-sexual or transgender(LGBT).
- Young people who are thought to be lesbian, gay, bi-sexual or transgender.
- Young people who are different in some way – they may not act like the other boys or girls.
- Young people who have gay, bi-sexual or transgender friends or family.
- Teachers, who may or may not be lesbian, gay, bi-sexual or transgender.

### **24. What do you think your school and Norfolk County Council should do to tackle homophobic and transphobic bullying?**

What can you do to challenge homophobic and transphobic bullying?

It is OK to use the word 'gay' or 'lesbian' to describe someone who is gay or lesbian. We want you to feel confident to respond if you hear someone using these words in a negative way.

Here are some ways you could respond:

"In this school, we don't use language like that. There is nothing wrong with being gay, lesbian, bi-sexual or transgender."

"That kind of language is homophobic/transphobic and you know it's against school policy to make homophobic/transphobic remarks. Homophobia and transphobia are as bad as racism and sexism."

"How do you think (name of someone) feels? How would you like it if someone called you names like that?"

"What do you mean by "that's so gay!/lezzies?"

"You wouldn't say that someone's trainers are so 'black', would you? So it's not acceptable to say that they're so 'gay' either."

"Gay is a word we use to describe people who love people of the same sex, not a nasty word to use against people."

"I'm really disappointed to hear you talking like that. In this school we treat everyone with respect and it is wrong to use homophobic and transphobic language."

"I don't like you using language like that. I think it's offensive."
