As you'll no doubt be aware, First World War commemorations are upon us. If your school would like to study the impact of the War on your local area, then perhaps we can help!

Last term we welcomed pupils from Wymondham schools and Gresham's who were studying the impact of the First World War locally. Students learned how to get the most out of our archive catalogue, reviewed different sources and used information from them for creative writing and drama in the former case, and to contribute to our August 2014 exhibition in the latter case (above).

We have also been involved in the Theatre Royal's '**To End All Wars**' project which will launch on **28 March**, **2014**. The website will include case studies of six Norfolk individuals who can help us find out more about life at home and on the front, as well as politics, nursing, society, engineering, conscientious objectors and more. Digital Pathways

The Norfolk and Norwich Millennium Library invites your GCSE, AS and A2 Level students to take part in a Digital Pathways workshop; an exciting opportunity in partnership with the British Library.

Tasks will include the effective use of search engines, how to assess the reliability of online content, and a discussion on copyright and plagiarism issues. The workshop will develop your students' critical thinking, information literacy, research and enquiry skills, through engaging with Norfolk Record Office: Norfolk Heritage Centre collections and trained library and record office staff members.

- ♦ 'How can we transport and harness water?' This pack is perfect to accompany the science curriculum and encourage enquiry skills it looks at water elevators, waterwheels and pulley. The pack is accompanied by YouTube videos demonstrating the experiments.
