Big WOOFYT noise in the Cathedral

Science day with a difference was a terrific success for Magdalen Gates Primary School, Norwich.



Jeremy Sampson came to the Cathedral in March. He works across the UK with his amazing, unique 'One Octave Organ for Young Technologists' – '*WOOFYT*' for short!

Children from Magdalen Gates learned about air and how sound travels before getting 'hands on' at making their own organ tunes using the *WOOFYT* pipes and buttons. They then climbed up into the organ loft to experience the real thing as George our organ scholar demonstrated the majestic sound of our 6,655 pipe organ! To complete their day they also became Benedictine monks and found out how to make their voices travel as they sang in various parts of the Cathedral, plainsong style of course, like those

medieval monks of old! Well done all. You were fantastic!





DID YOU KNOW?

There has been a **Herb Garden** at Norwich Cathedral since Medieval times. The Benedictine monks grew and used the herbs to treat illnesses and skin conditions. There was an infirmary here too, where people came to be cared for

when they were ill.



Polly Lavender and her team of volunteers designed and planted the present garden a decade ago. A book was written too about the herbs and is still on sale in the Cathedral shop. The core star design is based on the wonderful vaulted ceiling design in the Cathedral's nave.

The garden is used for relaxation and you can include it as part of school visits. Ask us about having a medieval potions & herb workshop for your class!
