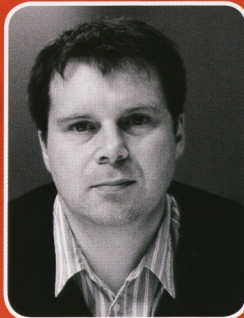
This high-quality, interactive, enjoyable and challenging evening event aims to explore some of these key questions:
