Teachers and voluntary leaders welcome guidance on visits near water

The Central Council of Physical Recreation and the Department for Education and Skills have jointly published practical guidance for teachers, lecturers and youth workers organising and leading groups of young people near water. The guidance will also be of interest to voluntary groups. It applies to visits at home and abroad.

Group Safety at Water Margins outlines a number of top tips to help group leaders minimise risks to themselves and their group when preparing and leading activities which involve working near or in ponds and shallow streams. Group Safety at Water Margins has been warmly welcomed, with David Brierley of the Professional Association of Teachers stating "space does not allow me to list all the extremely helpful points in this document" and Martin Ward of the Secondary Heads Association adding: "the document is sensible and straightforward in its advice". Meanwhile, Jane Town of the Youth Hostels Association, which hosts many groups on educational visits described the document as: "very worthwhile and elements such as the 'top tips' make it easily readable."

The guidance was prepared by a CCPR led working group with representation from the teaching profession, voluntary youth organisations, outdoor leadership and safety bodies. The working group consulted widely and this process has helped to ensure that the guidance reflects a consensus of good practice.
