Creative writing competition for schools

KS 1: design a coin with pictures that tell people about you.

KS 2: write the story about how and why this treasure was buried.

In Going for Gold folder in the Gallery section you will find lots of useful pictures and information about this treasure and its exciting discovery. Take a good look at this evidence first and use it to help you decide how and why this treasure was buried, then decide how you will tell your story.

- you could tell the story as the person or people who buried the treasure
- or as someone watching from a hiding place
- a number of short diary entries
- the story as a myth that has grown up around this buried treasure
- or even a journalist writing a newspaper report

Competition entry and rules

- Competition closing date: 15 February 2012
- The aim of the competition is to inspire creativity. The competition is split
 into Key stage groups, with a focus on drawing at KS1 and creative
 writing at KS2. If your pupils follow a different curriculum to their age,
 please feel free to enter the most appropriate category.
- The resources in the Going for Gold folder on the website and contains background information and pictures about the treasure and life in Iron Age Britain, to provide some answers about the treasure and inspiration for rich talk and developing of ideas, before children put together their entry.
- KS1 coin design: children may use any media on paper or card, but no larger than A4. The design should reflect something about the child who has created the art work.
- KS2 creative writing: Archaeologists have gathered lots of evidence about this treasure but story of why it was buried remains a mystery.
 Encourage children to make use of this information to explain in their story why this treasure was buried.
- Creative writing will be judged on content and strength to the story telling not hand writing and spelling though it must be legible! Work may be hand written or word processed.
- One entry per child.
