Arts Audience Participation Funding Launched (England)

Arts Council England has opened a new fund to support the growth and retention of arts audiences in England.

The Audience Focus fund is provided and administered by Arts Council England and aims to engage more people in museums, libraries and the arts by supporting organisations to understand retain and develop their audiences. There are three available strands:

- Strand 1: Understanding audiences: Supporting the development of national approaches to collecting, sharing and applying audience data and intelligence, to enable funded organisations to gain practical insight into current and potential audiences.
- Strand 2: Collaborative action: Supporting collaborative marketing and audience development activity to increase family and cross-generation attendance and participation in the arts.
- Strand 3: Best practice: Supporting the implementation of national approaches, tools, resources and training to raise and maintain standards of best practice in marketing and audience development.

Big Lottery Launches New Community Scheme

The Millennium Now programme will offer five grants to charities in UK addressing its project areas. Five project areas have been identified through Channel 4's Big Decision, in which people from across the UK fed back where they wanted £10 million of Lottery funding to go; combined with the results of an Ipsos Mori poll of 2,000 people from across the nation. One grant recipient will be selected from each project area. The areas are:

- Helping disadvantaged families to be healthy and live well.
- Helping different generation to share their skills with each other.
- Getting communities volunteering to address environmental issues.
- Bringing communities together to tackle local issues.

• Helping disadvantaged young people to learn new career-based skills. The five grant recipients will be filmed by Channel 4 for a new five-part series to air in late 2012. Applicants must consent to be filmed throughout the development of their project as this is a key requirement of the programme. Grants of £1.5 million and £2 million are available for projects lasting for up to two years. Five grants will be made, one from each project type category. The Baily Thomas Charitable Fund is a registered charity which was established to support projects in the area of learning disability and to aid the care and relief of those affected by learning disability by making grants to voluntary organisations within the UK and the Republic of Ireland working in this field. The Trust considers under learning disability the conditions generally referred to as severe learning difficulties, together with autism. In this area, it considers projects concerning children or adults. LankellyChase Foundation announces new approach to grant making (UK)

The LankellyChase Foundation has announced that from April 2012, it will only accept funding applications for projects that focus exclusively on tackling social disadvantage. In particular projects focusing on people facing multiple disadvantage such as lives of crime, homelessness, exploitation and abuse, prostitution, problematic drug use, enduring mental illness and reduced life expectancy will be welcomed. The Foundation also recognises that many organisations working with people who face severe and multiple disadvantages don't fit neatly into categories and require flexible funding. So the Foundation is moving away from their current programme approach, and is developing an Open Grants scheme that will offer funding to organisations that are working to build the capabilities of people who face severe and multiple disadvantages. It is anticipated that the new Open Grants Programme will be launched in the summer of 2012. Film Culture Fund area: England

deadline: 28 November 2011, noon

The Film Culture Fund is designed to help audiences throughout the English regions access a diverse range of film content, to enrich audiences' experience through education opportunities, and to integrate regional screen heritage resources into wider film provision.

Projects should address one or more of the following priorities:

• Programming – projects supported by Creative England should extend choice through locally relevant film programming engaging existing and new audiences.

• Education – film education projects should interact with film exhibition infrastructure and demonstrate the potential to encourage long-term audience development. They should also be aligned with the objectives of the UK Film Education Strategy: 21st Century Literacy (<u>www.21stcenturyliteracy.org.uk</u>).

• Reaching under-served audiences – projects should improve access by engaging with diverse audiences which are generally under-represented, delivering audience development through targeting of specific audience groups or communities with limited access to film. Projects should offer sustainability and demonstrate knowledge of target communities and specific obstacles to be addressed.

• Regional Screen Heritage – projects involving Regional Screen Heritage should be focused on audience access to film or moving image archive, in any form but support can also address the acquisition, preservation, conservation and curation required to enable that access.
