Kathryn works as a freelance RE Consultant in the Eastern Region. She works primarily for Norfolk Local Authority, the Diocese of Norwich and the University of East Anglia. In these roles she provides curriculum support for senior managers, governors, teachers and those in initial teacher

training across all phases (nursery to sixth form) relating to religious education, collective worship and spiritual development.

Kathryn is currently facilitating the revision of the Norfolk agreed syllabus and was a regional subject adviser for the Secondary Curriculum 2008. Kathryn is a trained Section 48 inspector and is currently studying part time for a PhD researching pedagogy in religious education. Kathryn was formally RE adviser to the London Borough of Newham, and was Head of RE and Spiritual development in two comprehensive schools.
