The power of partnerships

Forming networks and partnerships allows us to achieve much more while also offering a very high quality learning experience locally.

The Houghton Hall Learning Programme is an excellent example, made possible through a partnership between Norfolk County Council's environmental and outdoor learning team, Norfolk Wildlife Trust and the Houghton Estate.

Under the scheme, local practitioners can get free training, which then gives them and their pupils free access to the inspiring Houghton Estate for outdoor learning. So far more than 6,000 children in Early Years and Key Stage 1 have benefited. The partnership also inspired the original Forest School pilot in Norfolk, since recognised as a highly effective method of alternative education, helping young people to build self esteem, while older children can achieve nationally recognised qualifications.

The programme has been sustained through a collaboration of schools, environmental organisations, land owners and independent providers, all sharing skills and resources. It now has more than 100 Level 3-trained leaders and 400 level 1 practitioners.

Could your school benefit from a visit by a **Master Composter or Master Gardener?**

These Norfolk volunteers, supported by Norfolk County Council and Garden Organic, can provide free support to schools wanting to grow their own fruit and vegetables or help them set up a composting area.

Master Gardener Bev Page is helping Thompson Primary School with their after school Garden/ Wildlife Club. This year the school has planted an orchard, created a sensory garden and established a conservation area which is used for bug hunting.

Pupils at Poringland Primary School have been helped by Master Composter Charles Mutty. Headteacher Richard Burbage said: "He keeps a close eye on our food waste, and ensures that we compost as much as possible.

We are working towards our Silver Eco-Award, and using some of Charles' suggestions to make the school even greener."

Creating a productive school garden helps pupils understand which food is in season and goes hand in hand with composting, which introduces concepts like life cycles and resource management.

PATHS (Promoting Alternative Thinking Strategies)

Twenty-four primary schools across Norfolk are using an evidence-based programme called PATHS to support children's social and emotional development.

PATHS is designed for pupils aged five to eleven years old and uses puppets, stories and role play to help them to recognise and understand their feelings and gives them the vocabulary to communicate with others.

PATHS provides children with strategies to help them calm down when they are experiencing uncomfortable feelings. They also learn to develop their thinking skills and are supported to problem solve.

Evidence has shown that PATHS needs to be implemented as a whole school approach and that all adults in the school model behaviour to reinforce the concepts learnt in class.



Therefore all staff in school receive training so they can support children to use strategies to calm down, problem solve and develop thinking skills throughout the school day.

Being outside the classroom is the ideal opportunity for children to apply the skills learnt in lessons. Pupils are able to use strategies such as "Turtle" to calm down or the "Control Signals Traffic Lights" to problem solve and understand how their actions affects others. Schools have found that having a consistent approach across the school day supports pupils to develop self control strategies and to develop good relationships.

Rogd Safety Team Help children learn life skills

What better way to get the message across to young people about road safety than actually taking them outside to explore their environment?

Learning skills in real situations is a vital part of any child's education and can encourage them to take regular exercise and use healthier forms of travel as well as building confidence and eventual independence. Plus cycling is a great way to cut your carbon footprint!

If you think you could volunteer and help improve the safety of Norfolk's children, Norfolk County Council's Casualty Reduction Team would like to hear from you.

In Y1 we teach about safety in the school car park by asking the children to work out how they can tell if cars are going to move and learning about what all the vehicle lights mean.

This leads to safely crossing the roads outside the school. The children are taught how to keep themselves and others safe as well as learning about features such as dropped kerbs, yellow lines and tactile paving the things that as adults we all take for granted.

In Y5 and Y6 the programme promotes safe cycling on roads near the school, encouraging the children to use the skills they have acquired since Y1 to look for vehicles and make safe manoeuvres in a real traffic situation.

These training sessions would not be possible without the commitment and enthusiasm of our volunteer pedestrian and cyclist instructors, but with your help we could always do more.

Energy ambassadors are the ANSWER to cutting greenhouse gases

Young energy ambassadors from Norfolk, Suffolk, Norway and Sweden will be coming together in February to discuss how to reduce greenhouse emissions.

They will have the chance to boost their career prospects by making links with local industry, including meeting engineers working on Sheringham Shoal Offshore Wind Farm (SCIRA) and through undertaking a microrenewables feasibility activity with colleagues at Holkham Hall.





It is an opportunity for young people to develop a range of skills, and will give them the confidence to mentor younger pupils and lead energy saving projects.

Early action puts us in **top7%**

Norfolk County Council is in the top 7% when it comes to early action on carbon reduction, according to a government league table, securing a higher position than the Environment Agency – the regulators themselves!

This is mainly thanks to achieving the Carbon Trust Standard and installing automated meter readers, but we still have a lot to do to meet our 25% carbon reduction target. New government legislation means we must pay for every tonne of carbon emitted. If we don't reduce our carbon emissions this could cost us a massive £850,000 a year. Schools account for 70% of the County Council's carbon footprint. Most schools can now access information about their energy and carbon consumption online and use this to reduce carbon and save money.
