### Can I appeal for a place at an Academy?

Parents may appeal to a SENDIST Tribunal for a place in an Academy for their child.

### Next Steps from the Special Educational Needs (SEN) Green Paper

The Government has issued the draft reform of legislation for the provision of children with SEN.

After the Green Paper on SEN last year the government has now put together its new draft which will be considered for the government by an Education Select Committee. This means some changes may still be made before it becomes Law.

### Some of the points are:

 Statements of SEN will be replaced with Education, Health and Care plans (EHC Plans)



- Health and social care needs must be in the plan
- Education, health and social care
  must cooperate with each other.
   This means they must work
  together, but unlike education,
  health and social care do not have
  to deliver what is in the plan
- Parents still have the same rights to mainstream education if they want it for their child
- The right to tribunal remains the same, but parents or young people must use mediation before appealing to the tribunal
- The Local Authority will also be responsible for young people with

SEN from 16 - 25 who are still in education

- If an academy or free school is named in a EHC plan they must accept the child into their school
- Academies and free schools will be covered by the new legislation
- There will still be a Special Educational Needs Co-ordinator (SENCO) in schools
- Local Authorities must say what education, health and social care

services it expects to be available locally, this should mean you will know what support to expect for your child with SEN

- Parents may have, from the local authority, a personal budget for their child with an EHC plan
- The Local Authority will have to record all the children in Norfolk with SEN but not those with disabilities or health conditions unless they have SEN

# Working together to improve the well-being of parents/carers with visually impaired children

Virtual School Sensory Support and
Norfolk and Norwich Association for the
Blind recently ran a Well-being event for
parents and carers over three
evenings. Designed by Guide Dogs for
the Blind Association and the
National Sensory Impairment
Partnership, the programme was
aimed at supporting parents/carers
to raise the resilience and self-esteem of
visually impaired children and young people.

The event was attended by 16 parents/carers, many of whom had never participated in anything like this in the past. Feedback was very positive and delegates felt strongly that this had given them the opportunity to gain an understanding of the impact visual

impairment can have on the whole family.

Dorothy Bowen (NNAB Equipment Centres'
Manager and Governor of the Virtual
School) said, "this event showed how the
Local Authority and Voluntary Sector can
work together to make a real difference
to peoples lives."

Liz Ashby (Teacher from the Virtual School) stated, "the opportunity to bring this group together was too good to miss and the feedback from all was very positive."

### On Line Survey for Parents of Children with ASD



We are a team of researchers based at Goldsmiths, University of London. An exciting new research project being conducted in together with Goldsmiths, University of London, and London South Bank University, which is funded by the British Academy. The project is entitled:

Experiences of receiving and
Communicating a diagnosis of autism:
Perspectives of adults, parents and
practitioners.

The aim of the research is to conduct the most comprehensive review of diagnostic practice ever conducted in the UK, gathering information on the experiences and perspectives of individuals affected by/involved in autism spectrum disorder (ASD) diagnosis. The research aims to deliver meaningful feedback and

recommendations, in order to inform future national guidelines and models of practice; thereby improving ASD diagnosis across the UK.

## We are looking to hear about the perspectives and experiences of:

- Adults who have been diagnosed with ASD
- 2) Parents who have children who have been diagnosed with ASD
- 3) Practitioners/ Clinicians directly involved in diagnosing ASD
