Kids Lit Quiz

In November the SLS organised the Norfolk Heat of the Kids Lit Quiz, kindly hosted by CNS, last year's Norfolk heat winners.

Twenty five teams from sixteen schools took part with the added excitement of an author team comprising Mark Robson, Alexander Gordon Smith, David Bedford and Gail Gallacher. During the interval Waterstones provided a book stall and students enjoyed meeting the authors as they got their books signed.

The winning team was Thetford Grammar (A), with Thorpe St Andrew (A) second and Sheringham High third.

Thetford Grammar went on to the UK final in Coventry which was won by Cockermouth School who will now go on to the World Final in Durban, S Africa.

Look out for an email in June, inviting you to express your interest in entering a team for 2013. The provisional date is late November and we are hoping to hold the event at UEA this year. The authors are all set to join us again too!



A poetry competition for secondary schools

7 January to 29 March 2013

The National Literacy Trust has joined forces with the Authors' Licensing and Collecting Society (ALCS) to provide teachers and librarians with a competition and resources to engage young people in writing, and to teach them about copyright and the importance of protecting their own and others' creativity.

Research has shown that there is a relationship between attitudes towards writing and writing attainment; 75% of young people believe that to be a good writer means you have to enjoy writing but less than 50% of young people say that they enjoy writing.

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Author Visits: Darren Shan visit to Old Buckenham High

There was excitement in the air when we visited Old Buckenham High School in September on the day of Darren Shan's visit. Students were milling around the library at lunchtime, peeping through the window to see if they could catch a glimpse of the famous author. Any male visitor sparked rumours flying round!

Finally, Darren Shan arrived, students were shepherded to the hall, along with groups of pupils from eight other visiting local high schools and the author took to the stage. Darren had the audience of Y7 & 8's engaged throughout as he read out gory sections from his new novel Zom-B. Students then asked questions and I was really impressed that he considered the merit of each question and took the time to answer thoroughly.

Back in the library, students queued patiently to get their books autographed. Again, Darren gave freely of his time, writing messages as well as signing and chatting about tips for writing. Andrea Hassan, librarian at Old Buckenham, organised the visit in conjunction with Waterstones, supported for Norfolk SLS and was really pleased at the success of the event.

To make the most of the opportunity you would need to be prepared to do some preparatory work with students and to have a bookshop on the day.

Alexander Gordon Smith says "Yes, I would love to work with some local schools, and what you have suggested sounds absolutely great. I often do events ... with a big talk to the whole school / year group, followed by some workshops for smaller groups. The talks and workshops are really aimed at the idea of raising aspirations, and letting the students know that they can do anything they want to if they put their mind to it."

Why not utilise the pupil premium funding to fund this, targeting groups of students for the workshops.

The charge would be 3 tokens for a half day visit. Please let us know if you're interested.
