Bringing Pompeii and Herculaneum to life in primary schools

This summer saw a world class exhibition staged at the British Museum in London "Life and Death in Pompeii and Herculaneum" focusing on the destruction of these two roman cities by a volcanic eruption in 79 AD.

To coincide with the exhibition Civilizations in Contact, an educational trust linked to the University of Cambridge obtained support from the Heritage Lottery Fund to send specialist teachers into 5 Cambridgeshire primary schools to bring the history of Pompeii and Herculaneum to life for Key Stage 2 children through a creative combination of Primary History, Drama, Dance and Art and Design.

Andrew Wrenn, Cambridge Humanities Adviser and Jane Bower, Arts teacher will disseminate the outcomes of this project with practical activities and examples of excellent planning that could help Norfolk schools improve teaching about the Romans at Key Stage 2 and provide some useful pointers to high quality cross-curricular approaches.

Teachers will also learn about other history networking opportunities within the county and resources offered by the Norfolk library service.
