Based on artist Richard Caston's Living Stones exhibition and led by the Cathedral education team, children will have the opportunity to:

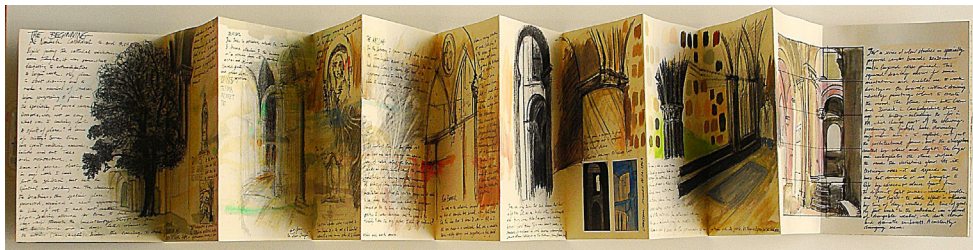
- view Richard's exhibition and learn about the ideas and techniques used

Part day tours and activities for KS1 and KS2

A range of part day tours and activities for KS1 and KS2 are available to book throughout the year and details are provided below.

The journey of Christian life



An encounter in the Cathedral to enhance and enrich knowledge and understanding of Christianity in conjunction with the RE syllabus.

Children will investigate artefacts, symbols and materials to understand how the Cathedral is used as an expression of belief, and how and why it was built to honour God.

The grand tour



An encounter in the Cathedral to investigate its history, building and architecture as well as its meaning and function as a Christian place of worship.

Children will explore every part of the Cathedral, learn about artefacts, different ages and styles of architecture and use all their senses to experience the awe and wonder of the building.

How long does each tour take?

Between one and one and a half hours, according to the age of the children, level of learning and how many questions they ask!

How many children can take part and how much does it cost?

A maximum of 20 children per group, but numerous groups can take part. The programme costs £2.50 per child.

Part day tours and activities for KS2

Monk's day part tour



Explore the life of the Benedictine monks in the 14th century, going back in time with Peter de Dereham, the cellarer, and his poor servant, Agnes. Pupils will investigate concepts of Christianity through the Benedictine Rule and how the monks' beliefs shaped their monastic lifestyle at Norwich Cathedral priory for over 400 years.

How long does it last?

The encounter and crafts session lasts two hours but can be adapted to meet your requirements.

How much does it cost?

£3.50 per child, maximum of 60 children. Adults and helpers, free.
