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SAW out and about!

On Saturday 1st February 2014, SAW ran a workshop for families at Whitefriars Primary School in Kings Lynn. The theme, chosen by the school, was 'Rainforests' and families worked together making rainforests in a bottle and canopies to take home.





The project was part of a Norfolk County Council partnership between schools in Norfolk and Estonia. SAW Saturday provided an example to the visiting teachers of how science and the arts can be combined to create activities accessible to people of all ages and interests – perfect for encouraging parents into schools and for building links in the community!

Fascinating Fungi

The SAW Trust organised a free event for families to mark the first of a new national day set up by the British Mycological Society - UK Fungi Day. Over 30 venues across the UK hosted activities to mark the occasion, and on Sunday 13th October, here in Norfolk, researchers from the Norwich Research Park (NRP), STEM ambassadors, local businesses and community groups worked together to celebrate the amazing kingdom of fungi!

Among the activities on offer were bread-making, storytelling, beer tasting and activities focussing on fungal diseases and fungi-based medicines.









Fungi experts from Norfolk and Suffolk took over 100 people on fungal forays around the NRP finding over 50 different species, including some deadly specimens! The WI cookery demonstrations provided tasty mushroom soup to warm people up.

This year's event is being planned to include a schools day and a family day - Fri 10th & Sun 12th October
