What do the police mean by hate crime?

"Any criminal offence which is perceived by the victim or any other person, to be motivated by a hostility or prejudice based on a person's race or perceived race; religion or perceived religion; sexual orientation or perceived sexual orientation; disability or perceived disability and any crime motivated by a prejudice or hostility to a person who is transgender or perceived to be transgender."



What is a hate incident?

"Any incident which is perceived to be hateful by the victim or by any other person."





Why are hate incidents taken more seriously?

The criminal courts have a duty to treat an offence more seriously when there is evidence that the accused person demonstrated hostility because of the victim's race, sexuality etc.

The court must therefore give the accused a longer sentence.
