Introduction

We want to find out what language you hear or use in school. In particular we want to find out which words you think are ok to use to describe something or someone, and which words you think are rude or unkind.

Will anyone know they are my answers?

No - your answers to this survey are private. This means that we do not know your name and no one will know who said what. We do ask you to tell us some things about yourself, like whether you have a disability or whether you are a boy or a girl. If you reply that you are worried about your safety, we will need to let your school know about this, so they can make changes to help people like you. They still will not see your answers.

What if I don't want to answer a question?

Just miss it out and move on to the next one. The only question we need an answer for is which school you go to.

What if I don't want to answer any questions?

You don't have to do this questionnaire. If you don't want to, tell your teacher. Thank you for taking part in the survey. It should take you 10-20 minutes to complete.

Bullying means people doing nasty or unkind things to you on purpose, more than once, which it is difficult to stop. It is different from when two friends of the same strength have the odd fall out or quarrel. Homophobic bullying is bullying someone because they are gay, lesbian, or bisexual or because someone thinks they are gay, lesbian or bisexual.
Different groups of people experience homophobic bullying:
 Young people who are lesbian, gay or bisexual(LGB). Young people who are thought to be lesbian, gay or bisexual.
 Young people who are different in some way – they may not act like the other boys or girls. Young people who have gay friends, or family, or their parents/carers are gay. Teachers, who may or may not be lesbian, gay or bisexual.

What can you do to stop homophobic bullying?

It is OK to use the word 'gay' to describe someone who is gay or lesbian. We want you to feel confident to respond if you hear someone using the word 'gay' in a negative way.

Here are some ways you could respond:

"In this school, we don't use language like that. We try to be kind to everyone."

"How would you like it if someone called you names like that?"

"What do you mean by 'that's so gay!'?"

"Gay is a word we use to describe people who love people of the same sex, not a nasty word to use against people."

"I'm really sad to hear you talk like that. I hoped you knew it was important to be kind to everyone."

"I don't like you using language like that."
