In the BBC Something Special series of lovely resources featuring Mr Tumble, this is a large format board book with flaps, with Makaton signing.

Grant funding: Foyle Foundation Schools Library Programme (UK)

State funded schools that want to improve their libraries can apply for funding through the Foyle Foundation Schools Library Programme. This programme recognises that many school libraries are in a desperate situation through underfunding and underdevelopment, and are not equipped to encourage children to read widely and read more.

The average grant is between £3,000 and £10,000. Please note that there are questions about working with the local School Library Service, and details of any audits are required. The School Library Service has an excellent audit service, just get in touch with the team to find out more.

Norfolk's Great Big Read - class visits to the public library

Norfolk public libraries and mobile libraries are encouraging all the adults in Norfolk to pick up and enjoy a book with Norfolk's Great Big Read from March $23^{rd} - 25^{th}$ April.

Adults in care-giving roles – particularly parents and carers but also school staff - are the most important role models for children and young people in encouraging them to see that reading is enjoyable. Supporting children to read for pleasure, as a leisure activity, is one of the most important things we can do for children's literacy and life chances.

So during February and March, if you arrange a school visit to your local library the children will receive an invitation for them to give to their parents and carers to encourage the grown ups to go to the library and pick up a book! Your school will also be entered into a prize draw to win 2 SLS tokens! Please just email the SLS team to let us know your school has visited the library.

Libraries may have limited capacity for school visits so please book well in advance to avoid disappointment and allow time for library joining forms to be sent home so children make the most of their library visit. Woodfields School partnership with their local Library

Sixth form pupils at Woodfields School (a school for students aged 3 -19 with complex needs and disabilities) take part in the **TITAN** scheme run by Norfolk County Council. This programme has been devised to help students who have difficulty with their pedestrian skills, which also causes them problems using public transport. This training aims to improve their independence and interaction in their local communities.

As part of the programme they have been visiting the library. In addition, a group has been visiting while the Bounce and Rhyme sessions are on and getting to know some of the parents and carers of the children. This has been really successful.

(As well as being very complimentary about Kate at the library), feedback from the school has included comments:

"Being able to take part has enabled the students to meet many targets such as:-

- · Visiting a new place to use skills already learned
- Communicating with people they don't know in an appropriate manner
- Behaving in an appropriate way in a public place
- Organising themselves to arrive on time
- · Working out their travel route
- · Increased self confidence being able to join in.

...it is nice to see our students accepted and welcomed by the local community. This has been a marvellous opportunity and we hope to continue our close links with the library in the future"
