Do we need gender balance in reading lists?

Take a look at a very interesting article by a specialist English teacher in a girls' comprehensive school, who questions the set texts for years 7 to 13.

Camilla de la Bedoyere looked at the books to be studied at her school and made worrying discoveries. All but two of the novels were by men, all of the poems, and all the books except two had male protagonists; one had no women at all! Those that did feature women tended to place them in stereotypical roles (mothers, wives, teachers), and many portrayed women as victims of violence – which is perhaps the most disturbing aspect of all. 
Carnegie/Kate Greenaway Award 2016

The Rest of Us Just Live Here by Patrick Ness

(Walker Books, £12.99 hardback, ISBN 9781406331165)

Typically original and beautifully written, this is an intriguing read. So intriguing I'm not sure I totally understood it, but this may be because I haven't read enough zombie and teen angst novels... It is spiked with black humour, which creates a lighter tone than is usual for Ness, but there are also plenty of issues of concern to young people: relationships, gender, mental health, further education and so on.


And don't forget the **picture books for older readers**. Recently we've loved:



The Sleeper and the Spindle by Neil Gaiman, illustrated by Chris Riddell

SLEEPER (Bloomsbury, £12.99 hardback, ISBN 9781408859643)

Amazing illustrations weave through this tale of characters we think we know from fairy tales, but with new, strange and interesting twists and turns. Even the dust cover – this is one you need to have as a physical Real Book! – is gorgeous and mysterious.



Wall by Tom Clohosy Cole

(Templar Publishing, £12.99 hardback, ISBN 9781783700776)

This has minimal text, but the pictures tell a dark and frightening story of the Cold War and the Berlin Wall. However, the family split by the wall, do escape thanks to a compassionate soldier and are reunited.
