Consultation launched into distribution of Big Lottery Fund

The government has launched a consultation welcoming views into how National Lottery money is distributed across England and the UK. The government is seeking views on new directions for the Big Lottery Fund as part of an update of the guidelines governing how and why it gives out money. The BLF operates independently of government in its individual funding decisions but is given a set of directions by ministers to ensure its overall strategy is broadly in line with government policy. The government has proposed the first new set of directions since 2012 and opened a consultation asking whether the proposals match the BLF's remit. Proposals in the document include a direction that would requires the BLF to take into account "the desirability" of requiring partnership funding. It also calls for charities to take into account whether a project could deliver measureable outcomes. Money distributed by the BLF, the proposed directions say, should go towards issues such as:

- Strengthening social mobility
- Strengthening volunteering
- Supporting communities with integration, health, education and environmental outcomes
- Strengthening the capability and sustainability of civil society organisations
- Supporting organisational infrastructure in the youth sector.

Views are particularly welcome from members of the public, customers, stakeholders and partners of the Big Lottery Fund. Once all responses have been considered the government will again consult the Fund on how best to amend the directions, before a final version will be issued in autumn 2016.

Flintshire County Council is looking to appoint an enthusiastic and creative freelance Project Coordinator to work with the Arts, Culture and Events section to deliver the Criw Celf project across the county. Criw Celf originated in Gwynedd in 2007 and has been a partnership between Anglesey Council, Denbighshire County Council, Flintshire County Council and Wrexham County Borough Council since 2012 to make it the first pan-North Wales visual art project targeted at more able and talented young artists. The project is delivered by all local authorities in North Wales and receives financial support by the Arts Council for Wales.

A series of six weekend workshops will be on offer working at inspirational sites across the county such as Wepre Park, Greenfield Valley and Theatr Clwyd. Three highly experienced professional artists will be employed to run two workshops each looking at a variety of artistic techniques and working with a range of materials including drawing, sculpture, painting and printmaking. Participants will also spend a day visiting professional galleries, parents and siblings will also be invited to attend. An exhibition of the work produced by the young artists will be shown alongside the work of the professional artists who ran the workshops. Work from the exhibition will possibly be selected for inclusion in a North Wales book of artwork from all the Criw Celf projects.

Participants will be selected through an application process. All of the county's primary Headteachers and Secondary Art Teachers will have the opportunity to nominate up to ten pupils who would benefit from participation in the project and who have a keen interest in the visual arts. Each pupil will submit two artworks, a self-portrait, the view out of a window in their house and a paragraph outlining why they would like to attend Criw Celf. The project coordinator will select twenty five young artists to take part in the project.

Criw Celf is an extracurricular project held outside of school hours and although links to the national curriculum may occur this is not a priority of the project. Parents will be expected to commit to bringing their child to the workshops wherever in the county they may be held.
