How can we help you help KS3 – and wow Ofsted?

'Key Stage 3: the Wasted Years?' is the title of a report by Ofsted * which is concerned about the lack of progress in many high schools at KS3 with a lack of challenge for the most able pupils.

Some teaching in MFL, history and geography was also singled out as not good enough, which resulted in some pupils not choosing these subjects as GCSE options, which will be damaging when the Ebacc measures come in in 2020 (current year 8s). All this can lead to a lack of momentum and interest at a vital time in a young person's development, which may not be recovered.

Librarians have an ideal opportunity to help the situation, by introducing new pupils to the high school library in Year 7 which can be a wonderful eye opening experience, after the often limited libraries pupils may have experienced in our many small rural primary schools. We can help with **transition** sessions designed to address duly identified needs.

Extra-curricular interest groups for pupils of both higher and lower ability are well placed in the library, particularly of course those related directly to books e.g. **CKG** shadowing, **Kids' Lit Quiz** and Manga and other graphic novel fan clubs. We can help resource some of these, with **Reading for Pleasure boxes** and **'hi-lo' resources** in particular. There are lots of ideas for running book group sessions online, including The Reading Agency's **Chatterbooks resources**.

We may also be able to help by adding to your curriculum resources with some extra titles in some subject areas, again particularly for more **reluctant readers**.
