



Teach Archaeology in the classroom: interactive, classroom-based sessions

Cambridge Archaeology Learning Foundation (CALF) sessions use many different subject skills, to introduce archaeology and the evidence we use to understand the past. Sessions cover a **wide range of time periods** from the Stone Age to the present day and can be tailored to subjects currently being studied. The sessions are designed around the aims of the History national curriculum and allow pupils to explore chronology and explore concepts such as depth of time, change and how evidence is used to construct the past.

CALF sessions provide learning opportunities which pupils might not otherwise be able to access. Pupils are shown how we discover the past, and get to practise many of the skills real archaeologists use every day. Fun activities include handling **real artefacts** and skeletons, looking at an archaeological 'dig' and pupils interpreting **evidence** of the past. As such, the sessions teach **key aims of the history curriculum,** from methods of **historical enquiry** to perspectives of **change over time**.

CALF sessions aim to provide a 'beacon' learning experiences which will be enthusiastically remembered by pupils as highlights within their study of core curriculum topics and are very suitable for subject 'launch' days or any other point in the school year. As teaching is done within your classroom they can be arranged with great ease, providing the learning without the hassle of arranging an out of school visit. The usual format is to teach one class for a whole morning or afternoon (about two hours), two classes can then be taught in a day at an average cost of £300 (half day rates available). To ensure the whole school benefits, an assembly can also be given to the school.

First Lesson (1hr)

How do archaeological remains build up and how we can tell how old things are.

Mock excavation in the classroom!

Part 3: Concepts and Change

Examining how we interpret objects to tell us about the past and how people lived differently. 'Museum in a box' activity compares real and reproduction objects from different periods. Pupils make their own interpretations.

Cost and details:

£300 based on delivery of session to two classes (morning and afternoon) and assembly to the whole school. Other rates available.

Teaching sessions take place in the classroom and are taught by an archaeologist from the University of Cambridge. Follow up activities suggested.


