Meet Mistress Matilda the monastery maid from Norwich Cathedral Priory who tells the scary story of how the people of Norwich set fire to the spire in 1272. Her friend Martha though, had an even worse time in the Great Fire of London in 1666!

- Drama for the children & costumed story telling, as they learn about how the monks at Norwich Cathedral Priory coped with the fire and how life continued afterwards
- Re-building and re-birth, they explore the concept of Trinity, particularly the Holy Spirit...how it continued to be a core part of the cathedral's prayer and worship and what it means for Christians today
- Symbols of the Holy Spirit, will be discovered: doves, flames, mitres & more exploring how these are depicted in the cathedral
- PLUS a snapshot of what took place that fateful night when fire began in the bakery of Pudding Lane & how our capital city rose from the ashes after the Great Fire of London. Participatory story telling about Master Farriner the baker's plight that night and how Londoners reacted during the fire.
- Loss, hope, destruction, re-birth, love, strength, caring—these sessions cover a wealth of concepts that span many curriculum areas

Great Fire Facts at St Paul's

Janet Marshall, Head of Schools &

Family Learning reports on the Great Fire, under the dome!

From 2010-2014 I had privilege of developing Gt Fire visits in this iconic building. Designed by Christopher Wren, St Paul's cathedral rose again from the ashes and gave new hope to Londoners after the devastation of the blaze in 1666. Working with thousands of children from across London, we developed workshop sessions to help them feel part of the story. One of the most amazing tales is of the marble statue of John Donne which plummeted like a rocket down into the crypt after the floor of Old St Paul's split apart during the heat of the blaze. Book sellers had hidden many books down there, so it landed on a bed of paper. It survived apart from a few scorch marks, chips & scratches!

Edith Cavell and her faithful dog, Jack

The story of WW1 heroine Matron Edith Cavell is special to Norfolk, she was born and grew up in Swardeston, where her father was vicar. She is buried in the grounds of Norwich Cathedral.

When she ran the hospital & nurses' training school in Brussels during WW1, Jack, a stray, was taken in by her. In her biography of EdIth, Diana Souhami tells how she wrote about Jack in her diary, in letters home to her mother and in letters from prison, before her execution by German firing squad in 1915.

Jack accompanied Edith when she escorted allied soldiers to escape points in the city. She helped over 200 of them go free between 1914-15.

"I re-created Edith's story for children. Jack always walked a step in front of her, hence my title: 'One Step Ahead Jack' Children relate so well to Jack."

Jack was 'stuffed' after the war and is now on show at the Florence Nightingale museum, London until 2018!

"I was introduced to the labyrinth when I came to the cathedral in 2014", says Janet. "Firstly the outdoor, version in the Cloisters, then the enormous, indoor canvas variety. It all seemed a bit 'abstract' to me". She then discovered that labyrinths date back thousands of years. The ancient Greeks scratched them on walls. There's older versions that were found on caves. Indian tribal ladies have marked them on the palms of their hands and walked a finger round them to ease the pain of child birth! They are a circular pathway. You cannot get lost and you always see your destination in the centre. Circles have long been a symbol of the eternity of God's love, encircling planet earth. They are common in Celtic Christian art & prayer. "I tried them with reception infants, through to year 7 using stories, drama and visual images on many topics ranging from discrimination, different faiths & pilgrimage, all culminating with a silent, slow walk and thought/ prayer writing at the centre" says Janet. "It worked! Interestingly the youngest often respond best of all.

Lindsay recently adapted it for use with SEN children. "It captivates, calms, stills and enables all sorts of responses & enquiry based discussion to immerge". She observed. To book a LABYRINTH EXPERIENCE in your school, just get in touch! It can also be incorporated into a cathedral visit.
