Labyrinths?

Janet Marshall, Head of Schools & Family Learning wasn't keen at first ...

I felt quite indifferent to them when I came to work at the cathedral in 2014 and inherited a project set up by the East of England Cathedrals. We have our superb millennium outdoor version in the Cloisters and I inherited a large canvas one in a heavy suitcase! The more I researched their history, that goes back thousands of years and the way they are used by people of faith or none and were used by ancient tribes whereby ladies used them whilst in labour...painted on the palms of their hands...the more I became fascinated by the concept.

I began to experiment with the portable labyrinth with years 7-9 then adapted it for use with ks1&2. They can be used with any topic, from relaxation & wellbeing, stillness & mindfulness, Bible stories, many R.E. concepts including Pilgrimage—exploring the concept of making journeys, creating holy places and spaces. They merge effectively, hand in hand with drama and other activities. They appeal to SEN pupils and offer focus and grounding.

All age groups enjoy the labyrinth walk which is usually the grand finale, as part of a structured session. We always do some deep relaxation exercises before we begin and there are visual prompts as they walk. It works brilliantly in the cathedral itself but is equally effective in a large school hall. Feedback from students is positive. Once they get over initial nerves, they get really involved in it and describe feelings of peace and calm, also appreciation of having had time to think deeply, as well as learn new facts and view points.

If you are interested in exploring use of the Labyrinth here or in your school, do get in touch! It can be made bespoke to suit your needs. Staff love it too and it is ideal for INSET/wellbeing sessions!
