Social stories and comic strip conversations

Outline:

Social stories and comic strip conversations are techniques, developed by Carol Gray, to support social children and young people with an Autistic Spectrum Disorder (ASD). Social stories and comic strip conversations aim to present information in a literal, 'concrete' way, which may improve a person's understanding of a previously difficult or ambiguous situation or activity.

Description:

This course will give an understanding around

- social stories and ASD
- the structure of a social story
- comic strip conversations and ASD
- the structure of comic strip conversations and ASD
- Using social and comic strip stories effectively with an individual with ASD

Supporting children with eating disorders

Outline:

Schools are likely to have a great many pupils who diet, purge or use diet pills, who misuse exercise, and who suffer from body dissatisfaction. Schools are also under pressure to take action on obesity. (www.anorexiafamily.com). In a questionnaire with young people in two Norfolk secondary schools, 9-18% of young people identified as having an eating disorder.

Description:

In this training event we will explore eating disorders in young people, and what schools can do to help.

Outcome:

Attending this workshop will enable you to:

Know how children are affected by eating disorders and be able recognise signs and symptoms

Identify strategies which will support children who have eating disorders Find out about services supporting children with eating disorders, such as the child and adolescent eating disorder service (CAMHS)

Outline:

Practical strategies for supporting children with challenging behaviour in the primary classroom

Description:

This twilight session will cover aspects of promoting positive behaviour at a whole school, classroom and individual level. It will look at what effects how we interpret and respond to children's behaviour, some causes of challenging behaviour and give some practical strategies and resources to use in the classroom.

Outcome:

To help teachers and teaching assistants to develop confidence and skills when faced with children with challenging behaviour and to equip them with some practical strategies which can be used in the classroom.

Practical strategies to support pupil's working memory

Outline:

This session will explore how teaching the child to manage their working memory limitations is a more powerful approach than repeatedly playing "Kim's game". It will look at what working memory is, how it impacts on learning and some practical approaches teachers and teaching assistants can use in the classroom.

Description:

Working memory is the capacity to hold and manipulate information in mind for brief periods of time. Up to three or four children in each class may struggle with low levels of working memory. It is often mentioned in Educational Psychology and Specialist Learning Support Teacher reports but what does it mean in the classroom? Is it just playing memory games and do these memory games work?

Outcomes:

To help teachers and teaching assistants to develop understanding of working memory and confidence with practical strategies that may be used in the classroom.

Emotion Coaching

19/06/2019 4.00 – 6.00 pm, King's Lynn Academy

Outline:

Emotion Coaching is based on the principle that nurturing and emotionally supportive relationships provide optimal contexts for the promotion of children's well-being and resilience.

Description:

Emotion Coaching uses moments of heightened emotions and resulting behaviours to guide and teach the child and young person about more effective responses. Through empathetic engagement, the child's emotional state is verbally acknowledged and validated, promoting a sense of security and feeling 'felt'. This activates changes in the child's neurological system and allows the child to calm down, physiologically and psychologically.

Outcome:

To learn about the theory and practice behind Emotion Coaching, including neuroscientific research behind emotions, attachment awareness and how to be an effective Emotion Coaching Practitioner.

Professionals working with children and young people on a regular basis, including teachers and classroom assistants.

Anxiety and Cognitive Behaviour Therapy (CBT) Approaches – A Taster Session

25/06/2019 4.00 – 6.00 pm, King's Lynn Academy

Outline

Understanding the nature of anxiety and how best to manage related issues with pupils in schools.

Description

This session will explore key psychological models and theories of anxiety, focusing particularly on CBT-specific approaches. It will recognise both "normal" and "problematic" anxiety and consider how best to manage the latter. It is hoped that sharing related information with pupils will help them better understand and manage their anxieties. This "psychoeducation" is recognised as a key component in most intervention packages. CBT-approaches will be explored in more detail, and the option of further, more comprehensive training (for example regarding the application of related techniques) will be discussed.

Outcome

Staff will have a fuller understanding of the psychology of anxiety and will feel comfortable sharing this information with pupils in schools. Staff will understand how CBT approaches interpret anxiety and aims to help in addressing problem anxieties.

Professionals working with pupils on a regular basis, including teachers and classroom assistants.

CBT approaches have been shown to be more effective with older pupils, i.e. KS2 and above.

Neurodiversity: Difference rather than disorder - Elaine Nickolls - Trainer

02/07/2019 4 – 6 p.m., Norwich PDC

Outline

Neurodiversity, as a way of thinking about individual needs, is thought to have been coined in the 1990s by Judy Singer; a sociologist and autism activist who has a diagnosis of autism. It was initially used by the autistic community, who were keen to move away from 'medicalised' beliefs that autism is something 'wrong' to be treated and cured, rather than being a valuable part of human diversity. The idea of neurodiversity has now been embraced by many other groups, who are using the term as a means of empowerment and to promote the positive qualities possessed by people who might be described as neurodiverse. It encourages us to view neurologically based differences in learning, social and emotional development such as ADHD, autism, dyslexia and dyspraxia as simply normal variations in the spectrum of what it means to be human. Further, it encourages rejection of the culturally entrenched negativity and stigma which can typically surrounded those who live, learn and view the world differently and promotes inclusive thinking around making adjustments to meet the needs of children and young people within the education system so that they can thrive, feel included and learn to the best of their ability.

Description

The session will;

- Explore what we understand by neurodiversity
- Discuss the advantages and disadvantages of this way of thinking
- Look at the traits usually associated with the 'specific learning difficulties' that lie within the neuro-diverse spectrum of additional needs
- Consider when these 'differences' because an impairment that needs 'additional and different' support
- Look at the Teaching for Neurodiversity resources that are still freely available.
- Discuss how to gather evidence to support referrals to the Neurodevelopmental Service

Outcome

- Participants will have a clearer understanding of the concept of neurodiversity
- Know how to access resources that will support training and development in their schools
- Know how to gather evidence to support referrals to the Neurodevelopmental Service

Supporting bereaved children in school communities

Outline:

The Childhood Bereavement Network estimates that 2.7% of children in Norfolk have experienced the death of a parent or sibling.

Description:

Children who are bereaved often turn to adults they have a trusting relationship with, and within schools this can be any member of staff.

This course will give an overview of children's needs after a bereavement, and will also explore the specific role that school staff can play. We will look at some typical issues that schools are faced with, and consider what role school can take pro-actively in preparing for and helping children following a bereavement.

Outcome:

Aims of the Training Event

- To develop a good understanding of the effects of bereavement on children, including their learning and their behaviour
- To gain knowledge about how to support bereaved children effectively, and how to respond to bereaved parents
- To gain confidence in supporting children and their families

Understanding self-harm and suicide prevention

Outline:

This training will cover self-harm and suicide prevention within the context of schools. It is free for all Norfolk and Waveney schools.

Description:

We will consider why young people may self-harm and what schools can do to offer support. We will think about when young people are at risk of suicide, and consider carefully what schools need to do when they are worried about a young person.

Outcomes:

- To increase knowledge about self-harm and suicide
- To understand how schools can support young people
- Be confident in using the guidance 'What to do if you believe a child might be at risk of suicide'

Headteachers, senior leaders (schools), designated safeguarding staff, school mental health leads, pastoral staff, other school staff interested in self-harm and suicide prevention

- Increase your confidence in teaching about mental health and emotional wellbeing
- Develop skills and strategies for keeping vulnerable pupils safe
- Explore a range of resources and activities you could use at school including DfE approved lesson plans

WORLD MENTAL HEALTH DAY (SUICIDE PREVENTION)

10/10/2019 9.30 – 15.00 PDC Norwich

This year, the World Federation for Mental Health (WFMH) has decided to make 'suicide prevention' the main theme of World Mental Health Day.

Outline

It is often believed that it is only adults who exhibit suicidal behaviours, but it should be made known that many children and young people engage in this kind of behaviour. There are numerous complex factors that contribute to a suicide, but what is more important is that all of our actions must be geared toward prevention. (https://wfmh.global/world-mental-health-day-2019/)

Description

Staff working with children are advised to maintain an attitude of 'it could happen here' where safeguarding is concerned (Keeping children safe in education). This does also apply to young people taking their own lives, sadly it does happen in Norfolk and Waveney.

This day will look at different aspects of suicide prevention with contributions from schools, young people and other organisations. It will be an interactive day and you will explore what you can do to support suicide prevention activities.

Audience

Headteachers, senior leaders (schools), designated safeguarding staff, school mental health leads, pastoral staff, other school staff interested in self-harm and suicide prevention.

Peer Group Supervision

To be booked as in-school twilight training. It can be combined with an additional facilitated peer group supervision session.

Outline:

This training will highlight the importance of maintaining staff well-being and explore how peer supervision could contribute to this.

Description:

- To understand the processes relating to peer supervision
- To clarify how peer supervision can provide a safe place and support whilst developing skills and experience of participants
- To practice a model of peer supervision appropriate for the educational context

Outcome:

Attending this workshop will raise the importance of staff well-being and enable you to run peer group supervision in your school.

Audience:

This session is aimed at schools who wish to implement peer group supervision for their staff/groups of staff. Peer group supervision is suited for all staff, schools are usually particularly interested in offering this to staff engaged in providing pastoral support, safeguarding and SEN support.
