Nicola Morgan is an internationally acclaimed author and authority on teenage wellbeing, how stress



impacts performance, effects of screens, social media and reading for pleasure. Her best-selling examination of the teenage brain, Blame My Brain, was shortlisted for the Aventis Prize; the prize-winning Teenage Guide to Stress, along with The Teenage Guide to Friends, Positively Teenage, Life Online and her popular teaching materials underline Nicola's range of expertise. In 2018, she was awarded the SLA's prestigious award for Outstanding Contribution to

Information Books. Her latest book, *Body Brilliant*, tackles negative body image. As part of her long-term work on the value of reading for pleasure, she created the idea of "readaxation" and is passionate and very knowledgeable about the benefits of reading for all.

David Reedy is a trustee and a past President of the United Kingdom Literacy Association (UKLA) and has



also been UKLA's General Secretary . He was also Co-Director of the Cambridge Primary Review Trust (CPRT) and formerly Principal Adviser for primary schools in the London Borough of Barking and Dagenham. David is co-author of the UKLA publication 'Teaching Grammar Effectively in Primary Schools' with Eve Bearne. The book aims to support teachers practically in developing young readers and writers who know about how language is organised to make meaning and achieve the effect that the writer wants as well as creating a shared vocabulary to talk about language. The keynote will draw on this publication and the recent project with 10 schools in East London which resulted in the publication 'Creative approaches to teaching grammar in Tower Hamlets Primary Schools'

Jennie Price is a specialist teacher with over 25 years of experience working in Norfolk Schools, previously



with Norfolk County Council's Education Psychology and Specialist Support (EPSS) and latterly as Co-Director of the Child and Educational Psychology Practice (CEPP). As such, Jennie works closely with a range of other health and educational professionals in assessment, intervention planning and delivery, training and detailed diagnostics. Jennie runs the Norwich Centre delivering the OCR Diploma qualification for the assessment and teaching of learners with SpLD (dyslexia) and has been a member of the Professional Association of Teachers of Students with Specific Learning Difficulties (PATOSS) since 2013. Jennie is committed to enabling teachers to develop the skills and knowledge which mean that personalised learning can, and should, make a real difference to individual pupils.

**Jon Biddle** is a senior teacher at Moorlands Primary Academy in Norfolk and has a passion for developing genuine reading cultures in schools.



He is the 2018 winner of the Egmont Reading for Pleasure Experienced teacher award and coordinates the national Patron of Reading initiative, which supports authors and poets in developing relationships with schools.

Jon is a member of the UKLA National Council, a regular contributor to the Open University Reading For Pleasure website and a reviewer for Books for Keeps and Just Imagine Story Centre.

He writes a blog on building reading communities in schools and talks about books at every possible opportunity.

**Amanda Roper** was appointed the Literacy Coordinator at Norwich School in September 2017 and has taught English and history at KS3 and KS4 at a range of mainstream and special schools during her career.



In addition, Amanda has specialised in the assessment and teaching of children and young people with dyslexia, working as an Advisory Learning Support Teacher with Norfolk County Council and the Child and Educational Psychology Practice (CEPP) as well as a cluster SENCO. As Literacy Coordinator, Amanda has taken a whole school, collaborative approach to raising the profile of oracy, reading and writing skills across the curriculum. In particular, Amanda is interested in developing opportunities, strategies and resources to support the use of language analysis and ideas from the field of linguistics to provide a more 'joined up' approach to the teaching and learning of English, MFL and classical languages at KS2 and KS3.

Chris Parsons Chris Parsons is the Deputy Head (Academic) at Norwich Lower School with specific



responsibility for the curriculum. He has taught in both the maintained and independent sectors, and been mainly focused on KS2 education for twenty years, having along the way has taught from EYFS up to 6<sup>th</sup> Form and Adult Education. Chris is a self-confessed obsessive regarding the psychology of how people learn and in particular the Philosophy of Education, and writes widely on education, as well as doing occasional lecturing for the University of Buckingham. Within the field of literacy he is fascinated by the possibility for learners of a genuine conceptual fit between a cognitive understanding of how language works, and their intuitive use of natural language as it developmentally grows within them.
