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Carnegie and Kate Greenaway Shadowing 2020

The longlists for the 2020 CILIP Carnegie and Kate Greenaway Medals were announced on 20th February, a selection of 40 whittled down from the vast list of 162 nominations published back in November.

The full and final shortlist arrives in a few short weeks (March 19th!), but it's interesting to see the titles which have already caught the judges eyes and could be in the running for the overall prize.

A few inclusions we find interesting: there are three translated books across the two lists, one of which— Lampie, by Annett Schapp and translated by Laura Wilkinson— is the first translated title to be longlisted for the Carnegie.

There are also several books which reimagine classic tales; both *And the Ocean Was Our Sky* by Patrick Ness, illustrated by Rovina Cai and Kit de Waal's *Becoming Dinah* re-work *Moby Dick*, while there are two fresh takes on *Frankenstein: Monsters* by Sharon Dogar and *Mary and Frankenstein* by Linda Bailey, illustrated by Julia Sarda.

There are lots of lovely books to keep you occupied, particularly if you have young people keen to start shadowing the awards. If you have any keen and creative 11-18 year olds, then why not let them know that submissions for this year's Young Norfolk Writing Competition are now open.

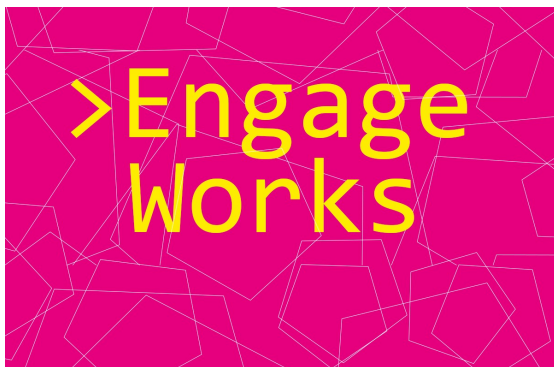
