Norfolk Library and Information Service online reading resources for young people

In public libraries, our colleagues are busy adding to and improving our Young Adult eBook and audio catalogue. They've added a Manga collection which can be viewed here (click link).

Online Resources from Norfolk Museums

Though they're currently all closed, Norfolk Museums have a wide range of learning resources available online, covering all ten of their historic locations across the county.

There are a variety of information and study packs available for key stages 3, 4 and 5 from Norwich Castle's education team (find those here) with similar downloadable sheets available for the rest of the Museums, including the Tide and Tide (KS3 and 4 here) in Great Yarmouth.

There's also the recently-launched EPQ Online Research School running across the summer, giving those 16+ students the opportunity to develop skills for EPQs in history, sociology, social history and more.

Tailored support will be provided by museum professionals, with access to the entire Norfolk Museums online collections and archive granted to enhance learning. Until a time when it is safe for the museums to re-open, one to one support will be given to students via email or appropriate video call. Most importantly: this is all FREE.
