Introducing: NEW BFI Film Club- Norwich

Half term opportunity for film fans aged 12-15 years.

The BFI has launched a programme of film clubs across England to offer high quality learning about film and wider screen media to aspiring young people aged 12 to 15 who live in Department for Education designated 'Opportunity Areas'.

Local production Company, Creative Nation, have been chosen to deliver one of the 8 new clubs launching in England during the Summer. They are hopeful that the club will be delivered in person, dependent upon Covid-19 restrictions. If this is not possible, the club will go online.

The Norwich film club has been especially designed for young people with an interest in film who are curious to find out more about how films are made. As part of the BFI Film Club, participants can expect to;

- Watch and learn to appreciate a broad range of films.
- Gain insight into the exciting world of film making both behind and in front of the camera.
- Get hands on experience of what goes into making a film on a practical film-based project.
- Meet other young film fans from across the city.
- Become part of the BFI Film Club alumni and access other exclusive opportunities.
- Have lots of fun exploring and making film!
