Sue Davies, Education Co-Ordinator for Children Looked After in the Northern area, contacted Parent Partnership recently. She wanted to highlight the need for information and support for carers who look after children accommodated by Social Services. Many of these children have special educational needs.

Carers do a vital job in helping children and young people in public care achieve success in education. They are supported by **Family Placement Social Workers** who can help in a number of ways, for example, by offering practical advice, out of hours telephone help and by running support groups so that carers can meet and share their experiences. "School Action" and "School Action Plus" – these are replacing the old stages 1 - 3. Please telephone us for a leaflet.

If you are a carer and have any queries about the education of your looked after child or children, then ask to speak to that teacher. Social Workers are also in touch with local Education Co-Ordinators who are based in North Walsham, Norwich, Great Yarmouth and King's Lynn. If you are having difficulties accessing special services for your looked after child, then speak to your Social Worker who can discuss it further with the local Education Co-ordinator.

Better Services ______ for Families in Norfolk

Norfolk County Council and Norfolk Health Authority asked The National Development Team (NDT) to carry out a review of Services for Disabled Children and their Families living in Norfolk.

Here are some of the things that the NDT have said we need to do to improve our services:

A Joined Up Service

Parents' biggest wish is for professionals to work more closely together. Parents often have to repeat their story to many different people. This can be very frustrating.

There needs to be a more joined up service, with one eligibility criteria (rules to decide whether you get a service or not) and one single assessment.

A Key Worker

Agencies should work together to provide a key worker to families who receive services. Parents have said they want to have a key worker. One person they can contact who knows their child and can act as a signpost and advocate. The key worker would help parents get the information and the services that they need.

Better Information

We don't know exactly how many disabled children there are in Norfolk. Agencies need to have a joint information system so that we know the number and needs of all disabled children living in Norfolk. This will help us to plan services better and predict what our children will need as they grow up and become adults.

Supporting Parents in Schools

Agencies need to look at ways of supporting parents in schools. Schools play a big part in the lives of Disabled Children. Having support workers based in special schools could provide ongoing support to families.

Moving into Adulthood

All agencies need to make sure that proper plans are made for young people approaching adulthood (known as transition).

The new Connexions Services being set up in Norfolk in September 2002 will be a key service for young disabled people aged between 13-19. Special workers should also be responsible for supporting young people as they move into adult life.

One Assessment Only

Parents and Children get fed up of repeating their story to different agencies and professionals.

Assessments from the different agencies should be 'joined up' so that children are assessed once and once only.

Short Breaks

Health and Social Services both currently provide Short Breaks (also known as respite care). This doesn't make sense. Short Breaks should be one service with one manager in charge.

This would make a better service and would provide more money to provide more Short Breaks.

Equipment

When a Child needs some equipment parents often don't know who they should go to.

The review team thinks that there should be one single joint equipment service. This would make the service easier for parents to get the equipment that they need.

Placing Children Out of Norfolk

Agencies in Norfolk should say that disabled children will live, go to school and be supported locally in Norfolk. We will only place Disabled Children out of Norfolk if this is in the best interest of the child and his/her family.

SNLG Video

The Role, Support, Management and Training of Learning Support Assistants

The Norfolk Special Needs Liaison Group (SNLG) is a consortium of 22 voluntary organisations and self-help groups for children and adults with disabilities and special needs. In Summer 2000 we published the results of our research into the work of LSAs (now called Teaching Assistants) in Norfolk. Our report, More Than An Extra Pair of Hands, showed that whilst LSAs loved their jobs, most of them were on the lowest pay scales, had temporary contracts, very little training and had to attend meetings and planning sessions in their own time.

We felt strongly that things had to change – that the work of the LSAs is far too important to take for granted. We organised a conference to debate the issues and to hear from Dr Maggie Balshaw, a national researcher whose work has influenced the DfEE Good Practice Guide. The conference was for 100 people; over 300 LSAs, teachers and SENCOs applied. We organised two extra conferences to meet the demand.

Our 27 minute video records some of the key messages from Maggie's talk. She examines the range of LSA job titles and roles, describes examples of good practice and tells us what the children themselves have to say. All Norfolk schools should now have copies of the DfES Induction Pack: Good Practice Guide – Working with Teaching Assistants, as well as the Index for Inclusion. The SNLG Video complements and provides a context for both these publications.

Norfolk Autistic Society

Norfolk Autistic Society has appointed a **Family Services Worker**, **Caroline Cable**, to work in Norwich and South Norfolk. She will be helping parents to come to terms with diagnosis, claim benefits and set up support groups.

The Society is hoping to recruit further workers to cover other parts of the county. This is a welcome extension to the services the Society is able to
