## Have you made your New Year's resolution?



If your child is going through statutory assessment you may be aware that Norfolk has a new team of caseworkers. They will keep in close contact with parents, supporting them throughout the process and beyond.



A number of former Statement and Assessment Officers have become Pupil Entitlement and Support Officers (PESOs) who have a lead role in ensuring that all children have a school place. Both Caseworkers and PESOs are based in local area offices.

## \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\* Special Educational Needs and Disability Act

Since September 2002 it has been against the law for disabled children and young people to be discriminated against in education. LEAs are required to develop strategies and schools to develop plans to improve accessibility for disabled pupils over time.

In Norfolk there are plans to make adaptations in schools where possible over a period of time, but other changes will be dependent upon the needs of individual children. The new duties cover areas such as admissions, education, associated services and exclusions. Ofsted

will be inspecting schools from September 2002 with these new duties in mind.

## People First of Norfolk

#### Growing up, Moving on

Growing up is a difficult business – for everyone.

As children with learning difficulties grow up they have an organisation which can supports them as adults to speak up for themselves.

People First of Norfolk is an independent self-advocacy organisation run **by** adults with learning difficulties **for** adults with learning difficulties.

They are supported by staff and volunteers to do their work. People First supports adults with learning difficulties to be confident self-advocates.

#### This means:

- speaking up for themselves
- standing up for their rights
- making their own choices and decisions (with as much support as is needed)
- being more independent

- taking responsibility for themselves
- trying new things, and
- taking risks.

People First also offer training and development, advice, the opportunity to learn office skills, to sit on management committees, be part of sub-groups, get involved with fundraising and take part in social events. They ensure that people with learning difficulties have their say and are listened to.

People First also offer training on "Disability Equality"; "Self Advocacy" and "How to Empower People with Learning Difficulties". They also held a conference last year called "Say No To Bullying".

The organisation was started by parents of children with special needs. Volunteers and staff have knowledge, experience and training in the concerns of families of children with any special need. We also have strong working links with all the statutory agencies and many voluntary organisations.

Contact provides a free confidential support service offering information, befriending, counselling and advocacy services. They have a helpline, run support groups for parents and carers, produce a regular newsletter, offer home visits, help and advice regarding Educational Statements, assistance with Disability Living Allowance forms for children and young people and tribunal representation.

The projects include:

 "I'm a Special Tool" - offers support for the brothers and sisters of children with special needs







#### **Great Yarmouth Contact**

- "Others Like Me" offers support to children with special needs in main stream schools
- S.N.A.P. Special Needs At Play -offers inclusive playschemes and other social activities for children with special needs and their brothers and sisters
- Alpha centre Toy Library safe, stimulating play environment, including soft play area, messy play room and enclosed outdoor play space. Wide range of toys and equipment with advice
