'World Voices'

'World Voices'* is one of NEAD's major schools projects, now in its third year. The 'World Voices' project aims to raise multicultural awareness and increase international understanding. 'World Voices' can help your school to deliver important areas of the curriculum in all subject areas.

Here, one 'World Voice', Anoushka Dave, relates her experience of one school visit...

As a World Voice, I regularly go to Norfolk schools running sessions on India.

During an hour-long session in one primary school, I taught the students an Indian playground game, some words in Hindi (the national language of India) and answered their questions about India. They enjoyed the game very much, not only because it was something different and they got to play inside on a rainy day, but because their teachers and even the headteacher joined in. They learnt to count in Hindi and say hello and goodbye. Then, it was question time. It was an informal setting with everybody sitting in a circle in the hall. As the rain became heavier, they moved closer to hear me above the noise from the corrugated iron roof. And as that happened they started losing their shyness and were competing with each other to get my attention, to ask me about all sorts of things about my life back in India and here in the UK, even about who I thought had shot Phil in Eastenders!

All things considered, I feel learning about a foreign country from books and videos can never make it as real as can a live person from that country in front of you. While the children learn something about life in India, I learn something about their lives and culture and it always makes a welcome change from doing laboratory work all the time.

Something teachers can do in the class before a visit from a World Voice: You can get the children to write down an account of what they do on a weekday or how they celebrate Christmas and compare that to an account given by the World Voice about his/her schooldays or how they celebrate festivals.

Videopack (Produced by the British Association of Fair Trade Shops)

This excellent new Fair Trade video outlines the unfairness of some trading practices and how this is being addressed by fair trade practices. The UK version of this video has an accompanying education pack and is intended for use with primary and secondary aged children.

The video's use of colour and music make it a vibrant production, which is in no way condescending to the young viewer. It is also, in my opinion, suitable for use with adults who have not had exposure to the concept of Fair Trade. With a running time of about five minutes, it provides a great deal of information without being too long for the younger person's concentration.

WaterNumerate

WaterNumerate is a resource for Year 6/7 which supports numeracy and the daily maths lesson. It provides three weeks of planned handling and lessons on data percentages for the post-SATs summer term. The 64-page teacher's booklet and three large colour posters offer the opportunity to analyse the positive impacts of a well scheme on a Nepalese hill village, focusing in particular on the life of one 13 year old girl. Other activities explore the global dimension of resource access and consumption.
