Exclusions =

If your child is either 'fixed term excluded' which means they will be away from school for anything from one day to 45 days, or 'permanently excluded' which means the school does not want them to return, it is a very difficult and worrying time for you and your child.

Usually a school does not suddenly decide to exclude, and you will probably be aware that there are some problems with your child and their education. You may have had telephone conversations or meetings with the school to talk about your child's behaviour in class or other issues. Try to keep discussions going with the school, if there is a teacher you feel understands your child and their problems, ask if they can be involved.

Sometimes children with Special Needs, especially those with emotional and behavioural difficulties such as ADHD. Autistic Spectrum Disorders and Tourettes are excluded. A child may be struggling with schoolwork, and their behaviour can worsen because they are not coping. your child has a Statement, the school needs to hold an Interim Statement Review, with a representative of the Local Education Authority and the parents before the child is permanently excluded. A child who is at risk of permanent exclusion should have a Pastoral Support Programme (PSP). You, as parents, and the Local Education Authority Representative should have been asked to meet and

discuss the PSP, which will detail the areas of concern and strategies, which can help the child to overcome these difficulties, and a teacher who is responsible for the PSP.

If you have to go to a meeting at the school to discuss an exclusion issue, it is sometimes a good idea to take a friend with you who can take notes and support you. When a child is excluded the Headteacher should arrange for school work to be done at home.

If you feel that the Head teacher is not going to change their mind about an exclusion, you have the right to write to the Chairman of Governors' at the school and ask to discuss the matter at a Governors' Meeting. If the Exclusion is permanent you also have the right to go to an Independent Appeal Panel who can return your child to school.

Exclusions are more common than people think and are emotionally draining for parents. Many parents feel a sense of failure and responsibility. Help can be obtained from:

TinyTalk (UK) is "helping babies to communicate before they can talk". Parents know that the hardest time is when our baby cries and that we cannot understand what they are trying to tell us. Are they hungry, thirsty, in pain, or may just need a cuddle? From as early as 7 months old babies can start to communicate through sign language. Just as you can teach them to wave bye-bye and to play peek-a-boo, you can also teach them to sign, well before their vocal cords allow them to talk. The terrible two's can also be a difficult time, but not nearly so terrible when they can communicate with baby signing. Practice shows that babies who sign, can often start to communicate verbally at an earlier age. This is because with babysigning you emphasis the word with the sign.

This highly recommended system of teaching babies to communicate before they can talk, is endorsed and accredited by Sure Start, the government's programme which recommends sign language, music, action songs and social interaction for birth to 3 year olds. The British Literacy trust is dedicated to building a literate nation and fully support and endorses the work of TinyTalk (UK).

TinyTalk (UK) is for all babies from birth to young toddlers. The classes include 30 minutes of signing and singing to familiar nursery rhymes and action songs. We believe music enriches children's lives. Through singing and having fun, language skills can be developed. Then 30 minutes of playtime for the little ones, and time for the parents to socialise and compare experiences over refreshments.

Baby signing is predominately based on BSL but its signs have been adapted to make them easier for babies. We also use a couple of American Signs, like Milk and More as these are easier for babies to co-ordinate.

I have classes in Wymondham Central Hall,
Back lane, Wymondham. Tuesdays: 10am11am or 11.30-12-30pm. Eaton Park
Community Centre which is situated on
South Park Ave, Eaton, Norwich (access
from Bluebell Rd & Colman Rd A140) from
Monday the 10th of May. Times: 10am11am or 11.15-12.15pm (Term time only)
Classes are run on a drop in basis, so
there is no need to book. The cost is
£3.50 per family.
