FROM THE CHAIRMAN

To offer this extensive syllabus in this our 80th year is perhaps a fitting reflection on our thriving Festival and the thriving state of music making in Norfolk.

We are particularly pleased that Paul Harris has agreed to become our President and look forward to a positive and exciting relationship. Paul has an international reputation as one of Britain's leading music educationalists and many teachers and pupils will be familiar with his stimulating publications.

Looking back over past programmes reveals various shifts in interest but all areas of the Festival continue to be well supported. I would like to pay tribute to both teachers and participants for the high calibre of performance that continues to impress our adjudicators.

The highly successful day at Thetford was a delight for all and indicative of the committee's desire to spread the opportunity to take part across the whole county.

Delight of a different kind was the discovery of the King's Centre. Formerly the Norwich Lads Club, this extensively modernised venue proved very popular with all,. particularly with the excellent facilities which include a warm up room, refreshments facilities and good acoustics. In fact it met all our needs and, as a result, whilst we shall continue to use St Andrew's Hall for choirs and The Assembly House for piano; most of the other classes will be held at The King's Centre for 2005. If you have not been before, be prepared for a lovely surprise.

The Norfolk County Music Festival is special in that we make a real attempt to employ specialist adjudicators for all the major areas of the Festival. In 2004 eleven specialist adjudicators were used and although this does significantly increase the cost of running the Festival, we feel it is worth it in a terms of the very high standard of feedback and quidance participants receive as a result.

The format for this year is very similar to that of last year and despite the fact that every aspect of the Festival costs more to run, we have managed to keep the increase in fees to a minimum. In most cases only 20p or 25p.

The main Festival is open to amateur musicians of all standards. It is not a competition as there are no prize winners (except in 3 classes) and therefore no losers. It is an opportunity for musicians to enter designated classes and to be judged by professional and specialist musicians. All entrants are awarded a certificate, classified according to merit and a personal written adjudication on their performance.

We aim to promote a Festival which gives pleasure and real value to performers and listeners alike. I would encourage you to enter and to spread the word that Norfolk County Music Festival is keen to welcome new and aspiring musicians of all standards.

The Festival is truly an open Festival - the only requirement being that amateur status is observed. Schools, colleges, groups of musicians and individuals and families of all ages enter. There are classes for practically all types of musical instruments, combinations of instruments and styles of music. The vision of the Festival founder, Arthur Shorten lives on through the award of the Shorten Cup and the cash prizes each year, kindly donated by his daughter.

Rules of the Festival

- The object of the Festival is to raise the standard of amateur music making by giving its practitioners the opportunity to perform in public and under concert conditions, to benefit both by securing a professional assessment of their work and from the opportunity of hearing their fellow performers. An amateur is someone who does not derive his/her living from the branch of performance, defined by the class title in which s/he seeks to enter the festival. In any ensemble, all members must adhere to that principle.
- 2 The Festival is open to residents of Norfolk and to such others as may be admitted by the Festival Committee.
- 3 Certificates may be awarded in the categories Outstanding Performance, Highly Commended Performance, Commended Performance, and Sound Performance. In classes A1. B1A. M1A. Q1A and R a certificate will be given but no award shown.
- The Adjudicators may also use the category "Participated but more security needed for a successful performance" if a sufficiently high standard is not achieved. All entrants will receive a written adjudication on application to the appropriate stewards.
- No entrant may discuss any aspect of the Festival with an Adjudicator except at the invitation of the Adjudicator.
- All applications to participate must be made on the Entry Form provided and be returned to the Festival Administrator, Brackendale, Poringland Road, Upper Stoke Holy Cross, Norwich NR14 8 NW, **not later than 30 November 2004.** All applications must be accompanied by the appropriate fee and separate forms must be submitted for each individual entry. Additional copies of the entry form may be obtained from the Festival Secretary at the above address or the form may be photocopied. See Guidance Notes for the Entry Form.
- 7 The Festival reserves the right to refuse entry without assigning any reason.
- 8 Entry fees cannot be returned.
- 9a Entrants in any classes for choir, orchestra or band other than schools must have been bona fide members of the choir, orchestra or band for a period of at least 2 months prior to the first day of the Festival.
- 9b In the case of school ensembles, regular members of staff may assist where appropriate but they must enter the appropriate classes for schools AND teachers.
- Where more than one test piece is required in any one class, membership of any group taking part must be the same for each test piece performed.
- 11 Entrants will perform only once in each class except for classes K 26 (teacher and pupil).
- 12 Entrants who are not ready to perform when called for will forfeit their right to appear.
- Whilst every effort will be made to adhere to the advertised programme the Festival reserves the right to make modifications.
- Pieces may be heard in whole or in part at the discretion of the Adjudicator.
 Repeats will not be considered essential at any time.
- Only stewards and accompanists will be allowed on the platform with entrants.
- 16 It is regretted that photography, audio and video recordings are not permitted due to the legal requirements of the Performing Rights Society.
- 17 Copies of all own choice of material MUST be provided for the adjudicator and, where appropriate, for the accompanist.

- 18 Where no publisher is stated any standard publication will be accepted.
- 19 Participants will not be allowed to perform at any time other than that given for their class as set out in the Programme.
- 20a The Shorten Chamber Ensemble Class, class J1. A Cup and prize money to the value of £200 donated by Olive Shorten may be awarded at the discretion of the Adjudicator.

 1st £100 2nd £65 3rd £35.
- 20b The Gwendoline Lee Memorial Prize Class K7. The prize is donated jointly by the Norwich Centre of the Incorporated Society of Musicians and St George's Music Shop and is a voucher exchangeable at St George's Music Shop. It may be awarded at the discretion of the Adjudicator subject to a performance worthy of the award. The winner of the previous year is ineligible to enter this class.

 No change in the set pieces can be considered unless stocks of any become exhausted, when the Festival Secretary, in consultation with the official suppliers, will set alternative pieces.

Please note that all entrants are required to make their own arrangements for accompanists. However, all entrants using the above accompanists will not be charged for their time on Festival days, as this cost will be borne by the Festival.

- 24 Participants may be invited to perform part of their programme in the Festival Concert.
- 25 A charge for admission shall be made for each person attending a class unless they are performing or have previously purchased a full programme.

All details confirming entry into the Festival will be found in the Festival Programme which will be issued to ALL participants in January 2005.

The Full Programme gives free admission for one person to every class except the final concert.

Entrance Fee for each day is £1.00 which includes the programme for that specific day.



SOME FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

When should I arrive?

All classes begin promptly at the start of each morning, afternoon and evening session. After that it is difficult to be precise although we do try to give some indication in the Programme. Sometimes people fail to turn up due to illness and other times we may over run if the adjudicator gets carried away! It is best to err on the safe side so that you are relaxed and can get the "feel" of the Festival before it is your turn to perform.

What do I need to do on arrival?

Make yourself known to the **Festival door steward** and hand in the completed MUSIC FORM which gives details of your name, class and the title of the music you will be performing. **MUSIC FORMS WILL BE PRINTED IN THE PROGRAMME SO THAT THEY CAN BE COMPLETED IN ADVANCE.** If you have forgotten your form we shall have plenty of spares at the reception table.

If you are playing or singing an "own choice" hand an **extra copy** of the music to the steward for the adjudicator.

Photocopies may be used but they will be destroyed at the end of the class. Other copies for adjudicators to use will be returned at the end of the class.

What should I wear?

This is a public performance and you are on show so appearance does matter. However, make sure that you feel comfortable and can breathe easily. Footwear is important if you stand to perform.

Do I have to bring a music stand?

Not normally but please see if there are any details under your particular class. We have plenty but if you bring a very large instrumental group it may be prudent to bring a few extra. There is a special conductors stand for choir, band and orchestral performances.

Are there warm up facilities?

In some of the venues we use this may be possible but unfortunately this cannot be guaranteed.

Who is in charge?

All the Festival stewards wear a gold sash. They are there to help you and to ensure each class runs smoothly. Please feel free to approach any of them if you need help and advice.

1 PURPOSE AND FUNCTION OF ORGANISATION:

The Festival's mission is to provide a platform for performance of the Arts by amateurs of all ages and abilities in a competitive but friendly atmosphere.

One of our key objectives is to provide an educational element and to encourage and maintain high standards through the expertise and integrity of the professional adjudicators whom we employ.

2 TO WHOM THIS POLICY APPLIES

This policy relates to children under the age of 18 and to those vulnerable persons of any age who are identified to the Administrator prior to their arrival at the Festival.

In recognising the needs of children from minority ethnic groups and children who are disabled, the Festival actively seeks to meet the need notified to the Administrator by parent or teachers.

Note: for the purpose of the policy statement the definition and use of the word "parent/s" includes guardian/s and carer/s of children and/or vulnerable adults throughout.

3 THE FESTIVAL ENVIRONMENT

The Festival seeks to create a caring environment with the highest possible level of protection for children and others to whom this policy applies.

4 FESTIVAL PERSONNEL

Our policy is to recruit and select Festival Stewards in accordance with their suitability for the duties of the required areas of supervision on the basis of personal recommendation and to ensure that they possess, understand and implement our Child Protection Policy in accordance with their defined responsibilities and tasks.

Festival Stewards are identified by gold sashes and the name of the senior steward will be made known to those attending at the commencement of each session.

5 PREPARATION FOR ATTENDANCE AT THE FESTIVAL

In order for the Festival to provide the highest level of child protection both during the Festival classes and at Festival concerts, the parent must be responsible for making sure that their child under 18 or vulnerable adult is at all times accompanied and adequately supervised by himself/herself or a teacher or other suitable adult.

Parents or guardian must sign the child protection section of the entry form to signify that they understand and will abide by the Child Protection Policy.

If there are special needs which cannot be satisfied by supervision of a parent or teacher, these must but made known in writing to the Administrator on the entry form which is attached to the Syllabus.

6 PERFORMANCE AREAS

The requirements and note in paragraph 5 also apply to waiting areas and toilets and to changing areas if provided as well as to performance areas.

7 PHOTOGRAPHS, VIDEOTAPES AND PRESS PHOTOGRAPHY

The use of cameras and video equipment in classes and concerts throughout the Festival is strictly forbidden.

If any parent objects to their child or vulnerable adult in their care being photographed by the press or any official photographer that the Festival may appoint, they must inform the Administrator in writing at least two weeks before the Festival begins in order that instruction can be issued.

9 POLICY REVIEW

The Festival committee will constantly review their policy and amend where necessary. In doing this they will look to other agencies for good practice, most notably the NSPCC and Arts Council of England policy guidelines.

A CHORAL

VENUE: The King's Centre, King Street, Norwich off Rose Lane – formerly Norwich Lad's Club.

DATE: Wednesday 2 March 2005 - 6.30 pm start according to the number of entries.

ADJUDICATOR: Gary Sieling

Gary Sieling is a freelance professional musician, specialising in all keyboard instruments. He is an experienced teacher, examiner, conductor, composer and adjudicator. Gary read for his BMus at London University and gained an MA in Performance at Anglia Polytechnic University, Cambridge. He also studied organ at the Royal College of Music and at Cambridge, gaining his FRCO in 1981. He is currently undertaking research for a PhD in Performance Psychology.

He is an examiner for the London College of Music and adjudicates widely. Previously a Director of Music at four schools before going freelance, Gary continues to teach in schools and is a visiting lecturer in Further Education.

Timing allowed is to include any spoken introduction

A1 Preliminary

This class is intended to provide experience for recently formed choirs. Adjudication only. No class award. Own choice of two contrasting items.

A2 Women's Choirs

A programme of up to 4 songs, including at least one unison song. Maximum time 12 minutes.

A3 Youth choirs

A programme no longer than 10 minutes.

A4 Barbershop Choirs

A programme no longer than 12 minutes.

A5 Mixed Choirs

A programme of no more than 12 minutes.

A6 Church Choirs

Two contrasting items suitable for use in the context of a religious service. Maximum time 12 minutes.

A7 Madrigal Groups

No more than 2 voices to a part; any combination of voices. Maximum time 12 minutes

A8 Vocal Ensembles

For groups of ten or under: own choice and not to exceed 10 minutes.

B SCHOOL CHOIRS

VENUE : St Andrew's Hall, Norwich with sessions in both morning and afternoon due to the increasing number of entries and larger numbers in the choirs.

DATES: Wednesday 2 March, Thursday 3 March and Friday 4 March 2005. There will be morning (9.30/10.00 am start) and afternoon sessions (2.00 pm start), according to the number of entries.

ADJUDICATOR : Gary Sieling See under Choral above for his details

In all of the following classes the adjudicator will take into consideration the suitability of the songs selected regarding content, style and vocal range.

B1 School Choirs for children up to and including Year 3

Adjudication only. No class award.

- a) One song with a water theme rivers, seas, sailing, fishing, swimming, creatures that live on or under water.
- b) Contrasting own choice.

Either of the above may include songs from other cultures.

- **B1A** Adjudication only. No award.
- **B1B** Adjudication AND award.

B2 School Choirs for children up to and including Year 7 – Unison The songs selected should provide opportunities for the choir to demonstr

The songs selected should provide opportunities for the choir to demonstrate ability to sing expressively with changes in tempo, dynamics and mood.

- a) One song with a theme related to moods or feelings happy, sad, afraid, pensive etc
- b) Contrasting own choice.

B3 School Choirs for children up to and including Year 7 – Two Part

Free choice. The songs selected should provide opportunities for the choir to demonstrate ability to sing expressively, with changes in tempo dynamics and mood.

Two contrasting two-part songs and not exceeding 6 minutes in all.

B4 High School Choirs

A programme of not more than 12 minutes in length.



C YOUNG SINGERS

VENUE: The King's Centre. King Street Norwich - close to Rose Lane – formerly Norwich Lad's Club.

DATE/S : Thursday 3 March and Friday 4 March 2005 and with morning (9.30/10.00 am start); afternoon (2.00 pm start) and evening (6.30 pm start) sessions according to the number of entries.

ADJUDICATOR: Stuart Smith

Stuart Smith studied at the University of Southern California under Gwendolyn Koldofsky, accompanist to Lotte Lehmann and Hermann Prey, then at the Manhattan School of Music, under the direction of George Schick of the Metropolitan Opera. He began his career with a nationwide tour of the United States with the Roger Wagner Chorals, followed by a number of tours and extensive research in Spanish music with the dancer Luisa Triana. He has toured extensively throughout North America and Europe as an instrumental and vocal accompanist and has been named a *Ständiger Artist* by Austrian Radio for his many broadcasts. Recent performances include recitals with Janet Edmunds. Gaynor Keeble and Emma Bell and the violinist Roger Coull. He was a founder, producer and conductor of the New Opera Group and Musical Director of Wide Angle Voice Theatre.

He has played for Master Classes given by such eminent singer/teachers as John Carol Case, Marjorie Thomas, Vera Rosza and Benjamin Luxon and has been increasingly in demand as an Adjudicator in England and Ireland. He was chosen to be one of the accompanists at the Festival of Festivals at Warwick University.

Stuart served as a vocal coach and held classes in Song Literature, Accompanying and Opera at Stephens College.. He now works extensively as a vocal coach, both privately and at the Birmingham Conservatoire; also with the distinguished singers and teachers Rae Woodland and April Cantelo on annual residential courses for adult students.

Classical or from a Musical and not exceeding 6 minutes.

C13 Sacred Song 13 years and under

Any setting of the words of a prayer or an aria from an oratorio or other sacred work. Not exceeding 4 minutes.

C14 Sacred Song 14 to 17 years

Any setting of the words of a prayer or an aria from an oratorio or other sacred work. Not exceeding 6 minutes.

C15 Vocal Duets/Trio/Quartet 13 years and under

Classical or from a Musical; not exceeding 4 minutes

C16 Vocal Duets/Trio/Quartet 14 to 17 years

Classical or from a Musical; not exceeding 4 minutes

Award

The Stephanie Caine Award for Class C9 This will be a voucher exchangeable at St George's Music Shop, Norwich. It may be awarded at the discretion of the Adjudicator subject to a performance worthy of the award.

SONGS FROM THE SHOWS

All performances using music from shows in current production are subject to copyright law.

Songs from shows in current production may be sung as a concert item – ie without costume or movement – without need for copyright permission.

D1 20^{th and} 21st Century British Song 18 years and over

Any song by a British Composer of the 20th or 21st century.

D2 Operatic Solo

Any aria, with or without the preceding recitative, not exceeding 7 minutes in all and including the spoken introduction.

D3 Sacred Aria

Any aria, with or without the preceding recitative, from an oratorio or other sacred work. Da Capos should only be sung where the singer wishes to ornament. Not to exceed 6 minutes.

D4 Folk Sona

Any traditional unaccompanied folk song.

D5 Lieder

One song of own choice - must be sung in German

D6 Foreign Song

Any song, other than German Lieder, sung in its original language.

D7 Vocal Duets/Trio/Quartet

Classical or from a Musical; not exceeding 4 minutes

D8 Recital Class – 18 years and over

Any two complementary songs selected to make a contrasting programme and not exceeding 10 minutes in total.

D9 Musical Show – Solo 18 years and over

Any song from a musical show and not to exceed 6 minutes. Please read note about Songs from the Shows on page 13.

D10 Victorian/Edwardian Ballad

Any ballad or music hall song by a Victorian or Edwardian composer.

D11 Gilbert and Sullivan and Operetta

Any aria from a Gilbert and Sullivan opera or from any operetta. Not to exceed 6 minutes.

She is also much involved in Public Speaking Competitions and has frequently given after dinner speeches at Music Clubs and professional societies.

Allison adjudicates most music classes and specialises in all work with children. Tim Pells studied at the University of British Columbia (BA 1977) and worked as a freelance guitarist and teacher during that time. He attended the Banff School of Fine Arts Jazz Performers' workshops in 1975 and 77, studying with guitarist Gene Bertoncini, and in 1978 moved to London to complete the Performers' and Advanced courses in classical guitar at the Royal Academy of Music (LRAM 1981). Tim studied guitar with Hector Quine and Harpsichord with Virginia Black.

From 1983 to 1990 he worked as Guitar Organiser for the Inner London Education Authority administering a team of 280 guitar teachers throughout London. Since 1984 he has been Head of Guitar at the Centre for Young Musicians in London.

Tim has taught classical and electric guitar at Colchester Institute since 1997, and in 2002 was appointed to the newly created post of Head of Contemporary Strings, running a department catering for guitarists of all styles up to post graduate level.

He joined the English Guitar Quartet in 1984 with whom he has recorded 3 CDs and toured in Australia, Canada, and Israel. He recorded in Bombay with the Indian fusion group 'Natural Waves', and has worked widely as a session player in the UK.

Principal publications include 'Teach yourself Guitar' (Usborne) and Sight Reading for Guitar (Punchbowl). He works with the Associated Board of the Royal Schools of Music as a mentor on the CT-ABRSM course, and composed the initial version of the Board's Preparatory Tests for guitar (1986).

CERTIFICATES AND ADJUDICATION – some useful information

Norfolk County Music Festival is not an examination – the emphasis is on enjoyment and learning. Therefore the adjudicators use their time to talk and to explain how you can achieve an even better performance.

In classes where certificates are awarded – these are most classes and those classes that are adjudication only are indicated - then a grading system is used rather than close marking. The categories are:



MUSIC

Outstanding – artistically and technically
Highly Commended – technically correct with evidence of artistic interpretation
Commended Performance – a correct and creditable performance
Sound Performance – a good but limited performance
Participated – more security needed for a successful performance

SPEECH AND DRAMA

Outstanding – a performance of heightened sensibility in interpretation which commands audience involvement, sincere to the intention , content and style of the piece.

Distinction – a performance showing the ability to evoke and experience beyond the printed word, showing imaginative insight revealed through voice and/or movement giving life and shape to the content.

Commended – a convincing interpretation showing understanding of meaning, shape and style.

Merit – a performance showing a degree of ability in presentation with developing modulation and interpretation.

Moderate – a performance of some ability but requiring great vocal and physical expression.

Fair – a performance with an overall need for artistic development.

The adjudicator may use his or her discretion to award Highly Commended Plus and Commended Plus where the performance merits this but is not *quite* the standard for the higher category. Feedback from adjudicators tells us that they appreciate this flexibility and they usually explain their decision making to entrants.
