

Nicki, one of our volunteers, is pictured with Emily, a mum she is supporting. Emily is currently at the beginning of statutory assessment for her daughter who has cerebral palsy.



Emily said she had not realised how much paperwork there would be and it was scary. She did not have a clue but Nicki made it sound easy. Emily had no idea her views would make a difference but with Nicki's support has written her own contribution. Emily feels strongly that her daughter should go to her local primary school where she is currently attending nursery. Nicki will continue to support Emily while the statementing process is underway.

Nicki says she gets great satisfaction from volunteering by empowering parents to help their children have an education suited to them. She feels she has been a success when parents have gained the knowledge and confidence to go it alone.

Our volunteers (Independent Parental Supporters) are given accredited training. Their role is to support parents who have a child with special educational needs. They encourage parents to be fully involved in their child's education by explaining choices and procedures and helping them to express their views to the school or the local authority.

Brainwave

The Brainwave Centre at Somerset was founded as a registered charity in 1982. Its primary objective is to help children with special needs to reach their full potential. The Charity's therapists assess each child's physical, developmental and cognitive abilities, before prescribing a programme of rehabilitation exercises. These are then taught to the child's parents or carers who will practice them in the Charity's therapy rooms until such time as the family feels able to deliver the programme at home. Every family is invited to return to the Centre at intervals for reassessment. The outcome varies in each case and no guarantees can be made. Initial assessment costs £350.

Musical Keys is a registered charity to enable children with special needs to further their development through action songs and related activities.

Children with special needs covering the full range of disabilities attend small groups from birth and are joined by brothers and sisters together with parents. They perform action songs, respond to puppets, play percussion instruments, listen to a variety of music, and engage in action and movement using materials such as parachutes and stretchy Lycra.

The children gain confidence, increase mobility, gain in self-esteem, develop listening skills and improve dexterity. Families are given the opportunity to learn the Makaton Sign language to assist communication with the children.
