**Happy Easter everyone!** This is a special edition of It's About Time to give you the latest news of our move. Exciting things are happening at the Norfolk Record Office (NRO) this summer. The Archive Centre will be opening in late summer, hopefully in time for the start of the autumn term. The new building is on the County Hall site in Norwich, just beside the ring road. It will offer many new features for school groups, and will include a major new exhibition area. We hope that teachers and their pupils from schools throughout the county will visit the new Archives Centre in the September term and benefit from its facilities.

The public searchroom at the NRO closes on 17 April. Over 12 million documents then have to be moved from Gildengate House into our new strongrooms - a mammoth task, expected to take at least 80 working days! This means that we will not be able to take any bookings for school or group visits to the Record Office in the Summer Term, nor will we be able to undertake any visits to schools in this term.

An exciting new venture at the NRO is the establishment of a Norfolk Sound Archive. This has been set up to collect and preserve sounds in Norfolk and make them available to everyone interested in listening to them. The sounds may be spoken word, music, natural or artificial noises. It may well be that children will be able to listen to the experiences of older members of the community, whether recalling great events like the World Wars, or the everyday details of living in the past. Children may well want to record the memories of their elder relatives too! The Sound Archive will be able to offer advice on techniques of oral history and may be able to lend equipment with which recordings can be made. We hope that teachers who have an interest in sound recordings will contact us when we re-open for the September term.

The new pack on **Late Victorian Norfolk** will be available from the beginning of the Summer Term. It is designed to link in with the QCA History Study Units 11 (Snapshot 1900) and 12 (Industrial Change) for Year 8.

It focuses on Diss as a 'typical' Norfolk market town and includes local maps, entries from census returns and trade directories, and material relating to the social and economic conditions and to the effect of the coming of the railway. Why not order yours now?

And don't forget that our pack on Twentieth-Century Conflicts, aimed at Key Stage 3 pupils, is still available.

Our Local History packs have proved enormously popular, with over a hundred schools ordering them. We will not be able to produce any more of these packs during the summer term, because of the move, but will start producing them once more in the autumn term, focusing at first on schools within Norwich.
