BACKGROUND

Many of you will remember last year's national anti-bullying week. Well this year's event being co-ordinated by the Anti-Bullying Alliance (ABA) promises to be even bigger and better!



Rita Adair, ABA Eastern Regional Co-ordinator has been busy working with local schools, public sector and voluntary organisations to ensure that Norfolk's response is a positive one. She says: 'The response from schools and agencies has been amazing. Everyone involved has been determined to make the week a resounding success - where Norfolk's commitment to anti-bullying activities can be recognised and celebrated.'

Schools will have received packs from ABA containing a wealth of ideas for things to do during the week. There is also a questionnaire which you can use with pupils and a checklist to find out how well your school is doing in terms of anti-bullying initiatives.

These resources are available on the ABA website (www.antibullyingalliance.org.uk) which also has all the latest news, information and resources about bullying as well as advice for parents, children and young people.

What's happening in Norfolk?

All schools will be encouraged to use this week to raise awareness about anti-bullying. This year's theme is participation so it is hoped that everyone including local communities will get involved.

As the creative arts is an excellent medium for involving children and young people there are lots of activities designed to raise their awareness.

Art activities

The first 300 entrants will receive a free Radio 1 blue band! The pictures will be displayed on two large figures in County Hall depicting a bully and victim.

Dene Zarins. Advanced Skills Art Teacher, has been working closely with schools in Norwich (Avenue First, Avenue Middle, Parkside Special and Heigham Park First) on a community art project. Using Totem Poles to symbolise belonging, identity and family, the children are creating stacks of cardboard boxes, depicting decorated faces to follow the themes.
