New director for sixth form

Thomas Paine Sixth Form - a joint sixth form between Charles Burrell and Rosemary Musker High Schools - is being launched in September. The new Director will be Lyndsay Knight who comes from Costessey High School.

New vocational courses are being offered together with a wide range of A level subjects. So many more courses means there is no need to travel out of Thetford for top quality education.



From Zone to Cluster

The Thetford Excellence Cluster starts in January as the Thetford Education Action Zone ends in December.

The new Excellence Cluster will include all the existing Education Action Zone schools plus Wymondham College and Fred Nicholson Special School in Dereham.

Together the schools in the Thetford Excellence Cluster will receive additional government funds of up £650,000 a year for three years - so the town's schools will continue to raise standards.

Among other things there will be extra support for:

- Gifted and Talented pupils
- nurture groups to continue in two primary schools
- new bases in each of the two high schools for students who need extra support
- learning mentors to work with small groups to enable pupils to do well in school

Also, some of the other very successful work of the Education Action Zone will continue. For example:

- literacy in the primary schools

- exciting art, craft and music sessions
- improved access for parents to health and family support

SureStart programme manager Gina Vass-Bowen says, 'We're building on what's here already so we can help make life better for Thetford's under 4s and their families.'

SureStart will bring an extra £9 million to the town over the next nine years, including a possible £1 million for a purpose-built day care centre.

Here SHARE and everywhere

Chances are everyone in Thetford knows someone who is 'SHARE aware.'

SHARE - the family partnership programme - is now in all nine of the town's primary and nursery schools, and there are plans to work with the high schools too.

SHARE helps parents and teachers work together to improve children's learning.

Parents can find out how:

- to support their child's learning at home
- schools use new ways to help children learn

and it's a chance for parents and carers to get together with each other.

So far, twenty-six teachers and teaching assistants in Thetford are SHARE trained, and more are coming on board all the time. Weekly SHARE sessions usually last about 45 minutes to an hour. Parents can come along to as many sessions as they can manage. Some are taking part in their second year of SHARE.

Activities like the Great Knicker Elastic Caper - which is all about shapes and sizes. - help parents to see how their children are being taught in the classroom.

Teachers and other staff are always around and parents can take any materials home so the fun can continue at home.

About 20,000 children a year call Childline about bullying. It can happen anywhere from the classroom or playground to bus stop and doorstep. Some children are bullied in their own homes.


Bullying can mean anything from being called names or being teased to being physically attacked. It hurts and causes worry and anxiety.

Anyone who is being bullied can do something about it. The most important thing to do is to tell a trusted friend or adult about it.

Teachers will always listen carefully when someone tells them about being bullied. In almost all cases they will not act without the agreement of the person who is being bullied. The simple message schools want to get over is 'We say no to bullying'.

Thetford Millennium Citizens' Awards

A very hungry caterpillar and the Queen's knickers



These sessions - where under sixes gather, with their parents, to hear stories and join in story related activities - usually attract between 30 and 60 people.

Janet King, Books for Babies co-ordinator, knows 'Books for Babies' is making a big difference. 'We want to encourage children to enjoy books, and the sooner they get to know them the better. Books open up new worlds and a love of reading lasts for life. 'We have a free book loan scheme, regular celebrations for one, two and three year olds, as well as a scheme that encourages people to donate books that toddlers can share with their families.

'The parent of every new born baby in Thetford receives a 'Books for Babies' welcome pack with a book, a toy and some songs together with details of the sessions we run, so we hope that everyone will come along and share the experience.'

The Toy Library, now in its third year, has a vast selection of toys for babies right up to teenagers and the hire charges start at just 30p a week and are never more than £5.50 but that's for the large outdoor climbing toys. It even includes delivery and someone to set it up too.

The singing, soft at first, grew louder and closer. It seemed the owners of those incredibly beautiful voices were trying to communicate with us as we sat, quietly waiting.

The music became people, dressed in patterned clothes, with beaded hair. The mighty Zulu Nation had arrived to visit us.

What an amazing sight they were, in their tribal attire, their strange language spreading to every corner of the hall. They danced in unison, mesmerising us and drawing us into their rhythms.

The Zulus introduced us to their customs and rituals and acted out the story of their culture. They spoke to us and we replied with the strange words they had taught us.

We were invited to dance with them, to wear their costumes, hold their spears and shields, to be a small part of their community. Later they encouraged us to sing their songs, dance their dances and draw the houses they once lived in.

It was an incredible day, one we'll never forget. It was brilliant to be introduced to a taste of another culture so different from ours. The whole experience was summed up totally by one boy. 'It was wicked!'
