Three Thetford pupils are starring in a new national video that shows teachers and parents how to help children to read.

The new video is the latest addition to the materials that support Catch Up, an effective scheme that helps struggling readers which has been developed with the Education Action Zone.

Ricky Fry (Norwich Road Primary School), Saffron Horton (Queensway Infant School) and Kate Smith (Canterbury Infant School) are helping to show that reading is not just about picking up a book. Reading is all around us - on cereal packets, road signs and the television guide, for example.

'Schools work hard to help children, but parents can make such a difference, and that is the message of our video,' said Catch Up Project Director Julie Lawes. 'It's in very simple ways that parents can make a real difference to their child's development.'

Catch Up is currently used by over 3,000 schools in the country. They will all have chance to learn from the experiences of Ricky, Saffron and Kate.

More to learning than lessons

If the end of the school day leads to an attack of mad couch disease, think of leaving the remote alone and look at the experiences that could be on offer.

Badminton, Rookie Life Guarding, Skateboard Club, First Aid, Dance, Art and Baby Sitting are just some of the activities arranged for 13 and 14 year olds under a scheme called Student Learning Accounts. They give people the opportunity to try things that maybe they would not have done before, and young people gain qualifications.

All the activities are organised and run by appropriately trained people. Transport, if it's needed, is provided too.

The Iliad - improved by Thetford

The comments of more than 120 Thetford nine and ten year olds are being used to make sure that any glitches in a new set of CDs of Homer's Iliad are ironed out before it is made available to schools all over the country.

Pupils at Abbey Farm Junior, Redcastle Furze and Norwich Road Primary Schools have been hearing the powerful tales of the Trojan War, told by trained storytellers, in a specially adapted version of these lively human stories.



The Greek tales on the new CDs, produced by the Classics Department at Cambridge University, can be used to enliven English and history topics. Teachers have been impressed by how well the trials have gone and how popular the stories have been with pupils.



Take a seat

Maggie Campbell, artist-in-residence at Abbey Farm Junior School for six weeks during the Spring Term, helped a class of eight and nine year olds create their own furniture.

Class teacher Les Woodcock was impressed, 'The children had to design and make their own chair from start to finish. They used all sorts of materials like textiles, cardboard tubes and tiles and came up with some very imaginative and unusual designs.'

More than thirty new after school clubs, from science and computers, to sports and cookery, have been launched in Thetford schools since September with money from the lottery.

These have also included breakfast clubs where, as well as being able to take part in activities from 7.15 am, club members enjoy a big breakfast at a bargain price. At Queensway Community Junior School alone there are thirty members.

Also watch out for news of the dance clubs and summer term activities at Thetford Forest that will be getting underway soon.

All these activities have been made possible by funds from the lottery's New Opportunities Fund, and some also have support from local firms including Danepak, Norwich and Peterborough Building Society, Jeyes and Kwiksave.

Thetford's Mayor, Albert Paine, awarded eleven students from Charles Burrell High School certificates for completing their Reading Partners training.



The students, who are about to take their GCSEs, are now reading partners for younger children at the school. Like employees from Baxter Healthcare, Trox, Wrexham Metalising and Thetford Education Action Zone, the students spend an hour a week sharing books with children. The volunteers talk about the books and play word games to support and encourage children to read.

Parents join in

A Learning Festival blossomed in the Spring. Parents were invited to see something of what goes on in the town's classrooms.

Among the many events which parents were invited to, were art, craft and music activities at Raleigh Infant School and actor Clifford Norgate's reading stories to children at Abbey Farm Junior School.

At Norwich Road Primary School over 40 parents and grandparents as well as friends and other supporters joined the classes of three to five year olds to sing and act out various songs and nursery rhymes. During the 'What's in a Song' sessions teachers explained how the subject of the song linked to topics the children had been studying in class, and then everyone joined in the singing.

Pat Sodey, Leader of the Foundation Stage and piano-accordionist who led the singing said 'It was fantastic. We all really enjoyed it, and we think we will do this sort of thing more regularly. In fact at the end of the summer term we will be inviting parents again for a 'What's in a Story' session.

The Learning Festival was supported by the Thetford Education Action Zone, the Keystone Community Partnership and the Early Years Development and Childcare Partnership. Other schools taking part included Queensway and Canterbury Infant schools.



Thetford Students Lead the Region

The successful pilot scheme of an imaginative project to help people gain engineering skills will be expanded in September.

The scheme enables students to follow a range of engineering and technology courses. It uses a new engineering training centre in the town. Students also have lessons back at school, and spend one day a week with a local firm.

The Thetford Inspire Technology project was officially launched on Friday 1 March 2002 by Gabby Yorath. Plans to use the new centre to support local businesses with their technology and engineering training are underway.

The project is another part of the Thetford Campus, which is aiming to increase the number and range of training and learning opportunities in the town.



It is also part of an East of England Development Agency (EEDA) project involving all six Education Action Zones in the region. Funding has been provided by EEDA, Thetford Education Action Zone, College of West Anglia, Breckland Council and the schools.

Drop in at the top

The top floor of Breckland House will soon be a brand new Learning Centre open 64 hours a week, offering flexible on-line courses and the more usual tutor led sessions.

The new centre, which will be open to anyone over 16, offers more than 400 courses. 'Learndirect' courses are computer-based and there is always someone on hand to help with the next step so no experience is needed. All sessions are broken down into bite-sized chunks so that they will fit into a busy schedule and you can do them as and when you want.

The IT courses include CLAIT, IBT2 and IBT3. The Directory of all courses will be available from July.

Aim Higher

Employers' demand for qualified staff and the link between qualifications and earning potential are leading to more interest in higher education. Students at Charles Burrell and Rosemary Musker High Schools have been finding out more.

Over the last year, closer links have been made with the University of East Anglia and all the further education colleges in the region. For example:

* 143 students in their first year of their GCSE course visited one of the colleges to see what they could offer and to get an idea of what life would be like as a student

* Several spent two days and a night at the UEA joining in various Science and Creative Studies activities

* This summer, seventeen Thetford

students will spend time at a university on a Higher Education Summer School where they will get a taste of student life for a week.
