### Delivering for children & families

'The inter-departmental childcare review: delivering for children and families' has just been published by the Prime Minister's Strategy Unit. The report outlines how new funding will create additional childcare places, establish new children's centres in disadvantaged areas and develop a more integrated approach to policy and planning at both national and local level. Local Education Authorities will be key in developing wrap around childcare and extended school provision in partnership with their schools. ### National Lottery New Opportunities Fund

We were very pleased to hear that Norfolk was awarded nearly £1 million in the summer 2002 round of applications. This will create over 1300 childcare places in 45 schemes across the region.

The October 2002 submission was our largest to-date with a bid for £1.8 million from 84 schemes to create nearly 2000 childcare places.

The New Opportunities Fund have also announced two additional rounds will be added to the programme this year.

### Information for Parents on Early Education

To help parents make decisions about early education for their children we have produced an information booklet. In it we explain who is eligible, where early education is available, how to get a place and the key stages of learning.

### Business Support Fund

In the last edition of Partnership News we reported on the new business support fund granted from the DfES.

We will soon be able to offer you support online with distant learning tutorials for business planning, marketing, developing your service, ICT and financial planning.

We have also developed an online community where you can join discussion groups and talk with like-minded people about childcare and early years issues.

### Support for After School Clubs

Consultation will take place this term with a number of after schools clubs to find out how they can be best supported. The findings will help us develop a support package that should become available in 2003.

### Sure Start

From 11 December 2002 Sure Start became the overarching name for early education, childcare, health and family support including Sure Start local programmes.

Sure Start is all about making life better for children, parents and communities by bringing together:

- early education
- childcare
- health and family support

Sure Start is the next step in the Government's commitment to deliver:

- the best start in life for every child
- better opportunities for parents
- affordable, good quality childcare
- stronger and safer communities

& it comes under Department for Education and Skills and Department for Work and Pensions

### The EYDCP Implementation Plan

### Funding for three and four year olds

Norfolk is one step closer to being able to offer universal early years education for all three year olds with funding now available to three year olds born between 1st January and 30th November 1999. Headcount day is 16th January 2003 for all provisions eligible for funding.

# Introducing the Link Teacher team

In this edition of Partnership News we take a closer look at the Advisory Service and the Early Years Co-ordinators and Link Teachers.

This team has recently expanded and now consists of three full time Early Years co-ordinators and 11 Link Teachers.

If you are one of the 400 providers in the non-maintained sector in Norfolk that offer the foundation stage curriculum the Link Teachers should already be familiar to you.

To offer the foundation stage curriculum, the DfES ask that all providers have the support of a qualified teacher and this is where the Link Teachers come in.

The Link teachers are here to give you help, guidance and ensure quality and standards are maintained and improved in this very important stage of learning. They also have access to the Early Years resource bank that can offer a range of materials and teaching tools.

The team will be supporting providers' delivering the Foundation Stage curriculum with visits at least once a term and will always be on hand to respond to requests for advice and support.

We have a target of ensuring there is one teacher to every ten non-maintained providers by 2004 and each of the newly appointed link teachers will have a case-load that means this target is well on the way to being met.



Joined up services are exactly that, where services and facilities can overlap and complement each other in terms of childcare, health, adult learning, early education and so on. It makes sense to join them together so each benefits from the other in terms of resource and support.

## Fen Border Mini Sure Start wins top award

In recognition of this fantastic initiative Norfolk EYDCP and Cambridgeshire Care and Education Partnership have received an award from 'Partners in Excellence' under the category 'Making the most of Partnership Working'. Marcelle Curtis, Head of Early Years and Childcare strategy for Norfolk, together with Gill Heaford, Vice Chair of the Norfolk Partnership and colleagues from Cambridgeshire received the award from Cherie Booth QC who is patron of the Awards at a ceremony held in London on the 10th December 2002.

There is a great deal of talk about joined up services but what exactly is it all about. With so many new initiatives being introduced with Sure Start, Neighbourhood nurseries, extended schools, childminder networks and so on is there a danger of overlap?

The government have a vision of providing communities with a 'one-stop shop' of child care, health care, education and parental support.

Partnership News takes a closer look at a project in West Norfolk that is putting joined up services into practice.

Emneth nursery is currently a hub of activity in the rural fens of Norfolk because the

nursery has become the focal point for a number of joined up initiatives not to mention their own bid to become a neighbourhood nursery.

### The bid to become a neighbourhood nursery

Emneth has some ambitious plans in their bid and this links very closely to the nursery becoming a focal point for the Fen Border Sure Start initiative.

By joining together it enables Emneth to bid for capital funding from the Sure Start programme and Neighbourhood Nurseries Initiative (NNI).

The funding would enable Emneth and the surrounding villages to benefit from:

- Childcare
- A childminder network
- Toy library
- Support group for children with additional needs and their families
- Family learning
- Health activities
- Parent and toddler groups
- training

Jill Wharton, head teacher of Emneth nursery, appointed in the summer 2002 is delighted to be working on the initiative 'Emneth is known as a pocket of disadvantage and the surrounding villages are incredibly rural. This family centred service should be a breath of fresh air for the children and families who will benefit.'

### Fen Border Sure Start

Emneth becoming a neighbourhood nursery is not the end of the story as some of the

funding is coming from the Sure Start initiative set up by the government. The Fen Border Sure Start links in to Emneth but will also offer outreach services to the villages spread across the isolated Fenlands stretching from West Walton to Welney to Upwell and Marshland St James, Friday Bridge and Elm.

In total almost 600 children under the age of four should benefit from the programme with plans to build on the services available through the nursery.

Parental involvement in the programme has been a key factor. Right from the start parents are consulted and can contribute to the way the Sure Start programme develops in their area.

The icing on the cake is the cross border nature of the project, run by the Cambridgeshire and Norfolk Partnerships.

Valerie Heath, programme co-ordinator comments 'It is an exciting time to be involved with the project. It has provided an initiative to both counties to seek creative ways of working together to provide services needed in this rural area.'

### After School Care

To complete the picture the nearby primary school has bid for New Opportunities Funding from the National Lottery to offer after school care.

Following the summertime release of the Education bill school governors can be responsible for managing the childcare.

### Progress so far


This is an enormous initiative with many strands to it but much progress has already been made with the beginning of the childminder network, support groups for children with additional needs and parents, parent and toddler groups and three new staff in place for Fen Border Sure Start. Bids will be submitted for capital funding soon for NNI and Sure Start money has been granted.

Recruiting people into the childcare profession is an on going challenge. The DfES recognise there is a national shortage of qualified childcare workers and periodically runs nationwide marketing campaigns to encourage recruitment.

This article looks at how the Norfolk EYDCP is trying to combat this growing problem.



From April 2003 the Inland Revenue will be changing the way it supports parents with tax credits. Working Family Tax Credit (WFTC) will be no more and gets replaced with Child Tax Credit and Working Tax Credit.

As the new names suggest support for families is still a key focus but Working Tax Credit will include adults without children, both will help tackle poverty.

Child Tax Credit will bring together elements from Income Support, Income-based Jobseekers allowance, WFTC, disabled persons tax credit and the Children's tax credit.

# recruitment

## the ongoing challenge

We have already reported on the huge success Norfolk has achieved bidding for National Opportunities funding to create more childcare places, with the most recent bid hoping to create 2000 places. That also means more jobs in childcare so there is certainly the demand but what is being done about supply?

The Norfolk EYDCP has a dedicated training and recruitment team who spend a great deal of time pro-actively encouraging individuals to consider childcare as a career.

The team is responsible for;

- publishing a weekly job vacancy list on paper, our website, the childcare link national website and through local jobcentres
- running Making Choices courses for people considering a career in childcare
- Attending local job fairs and recruitment events
- Creating public awareness of Childcare as a career and the training courses available by ensuring information in places like the Learning Shop is readily available
- Running roadshow events at venues across the county

### And in the future..?

The EYDCP will continue to promote childcare as a career option at every possible opportunity. We have plans to publish courses in the widely distributed Adult Education course booklets and we start 2003 with a dedicated recruitment campaign.

The campaign will focus on 'New Year, new start' and will include press activity, radio adverts, roadshow events, Making Choices courses and much more.

### Successfully Recruiting Staff – a case study

If you are finding it difficult to recruit staff don't get down hearted, The Barn Club in Poringland were faced with the onerous task of recruiting five new posts in the summer and were pleasantly surprised with the response. Forty eight candidates applied for the position and Ruth Foster who is the Childcare Manager at the Club put it down to careful planning, learning from previous experience and timing. She comments 'We tried to structure the role's around the potential candidates paying close attention to working hours and making sure rates of pay were competitive. The Barn Club also has an excellent reputation so I'm sure that

helped'. Not only was the Barn Club able to successfully recruit for this position but they now have a list of potential candidates if anything else comes up in the future.

### Top Tips to successful recruitment

- Discuss the precise requirements of the job with everyone involved in the recruitment decision and be clear what you are looking for
- Prepare a job description
- Draft an inspiring and eye catching advert - don't forget we offer a job vacancy service
- Make sure you offer salary and benefits in line with your competitors
- Put out feelers in the local community – word of mouth is very powerful
- Consider getting together with other providers and buddy up to offer a better range of hours
- Be professional, the candidates will be interviewing you as much as you are interviewing them
- Make all candidates aware of your final decision
- Your salary bill will be your biggest outgoing so recruit wisely - don't make the appointment if you are unsure
- Keep a record of all short listed applicants in case you need to recruit again in the future

# working family tax credit is changing

### What's new?

- Whether parents are working or not they could be eligible for Child Tax Credit.
- The main carer will receive the payments.

### The Child Tax Credit Comprises:

<b>Family element</b> c. £10.45 per week	max entitlement
<b>Family element, baby addition</b> c. £10.45 per week	max entitlement
<b>Child element</b> c. £27.75 per week max entitlement	
<b>Disabled child element</b> c. £41.30 per week	max entitlement
<b>Enhanced disabled child element</b> c. £16.60 per week max entitlement	

- Available to both lone parents and couples with one or more children.
- Working Tax Credit provides a top up to low income workers
- Paid directly into the wage packet

### The Working Tax Credit Comprises:

<b>Basic element</b> - c £29.20 per week	max entitlement
<b>Couples/lone parent element</b> - c £28.80 per week	max entitlement
<b>Childcare element</b> - covers 70% of qualifying childcare costs up to max limits	

### How to claim

Claims can be made for both tax credits on the same form. Forms can be obtained from the Inland Revenue by phone on 0845 300 3900 or individuals can apply online at [www.inlandrevenue.gov.uk/taxcredits](http://www.inlandrevenue.gov.uk/taxcredits) Awards will be based on annual income in the previous year.

### Eligibility

The Inland Revenue ultimately determine how much individuals are eligible for but there is some guidance:

- Based on gross income
- Full child tax credit for Job seekers and Income support recipients
- Full working tax credit for incomes under £5,060
- Full child tax credit for income up to £13,230
- Full family element of tax credit for incomes up to £50,000

### What can childcare providers do?

One of the biggest obstacles for parents getting quality childcare is affordability. It is proven that providers who inform parents about the tax credits available fill more child care spaces for longer and therefore ensure their own sustainability.

Why not get a supply of claim packs from the Inland Revenue and make parents aware of their eligibility.

# extended schools the role they play in childcare

With the introduction of the Education Act last summer, school-governing bodies have been empowered to manage childcare on school premises.

This together with support from the DfES has encouraged many schools to consider offering childcare facilities.

Schools offering childcare makes a lot of sense particularly in areas of disadvantage where voluntary or independent providers are harder to find or find it increasingly difficult to justify opening new facilities that may not remain sustainable. Schools, with ready-made facilities and premises could be the answer to closing the childcare gap.

Schools also readily lend themselves to breakfast clubs and after school care for children of school age. Providing childcare for pre-school children in their local community and at a school they may ultimately attend also leads to smooth transition into the school environment.

This extension of services does not stop at childcare, it can also support community needs and be a single point of access for an integrated range of family services including childcare, healthcare and adult education.

## What impact will this have on existing providers?

Many readers of Partnership News may have had a long hard struggle securing appropriate premises for their provision or may still be searching and the thought of competition from schools may cause concern.

Rest assured the EYDCP is very aware of spread of childcare in Norfolk and any request for support from new providers, whether schools, volunteer groups or independent providers, would be assessed based on demand and existing provision in the area.

School Governors are also empowered to appoint partners or outside organisations to run the childcare provision on their behalf.

# news from the development teams



## The West Team

It's been as busy as ever in the West. We are now fully staffed and welcome Karen Johnson to cover the West Walton, Terrington, Swaffham and Downham Market High School Catchment areas. We have finished all our initial proactive survey work across the Western area and have prepared a report of our findings for each high school catchment. We are using this as the starting point for encouraging any new developments locally. We continue to be successful in being awarded NOF grants for new out of school childcare and working with new providers to create more new places. The Development Workers are working really hard to make sure that the new places are open as soon as possible. In some areas however we are reaching the stage where "saturation point" is being reached especially King's Lynn itself. Anyone thinking of expanding or developing new provision is welcome to give us a ring to ensure that their ideas will fit in with current developments that may not be widely known yet. Hopefully we will be able to support you in making your vision reality.

We have enjoyed getting out into the patch and in particular the Family Fun day in Wells at half term and the Roadshow in Fakenham in November. We look forward to meeting some of you soon.



## Central Development Team

The Central team submitted their biggest bid for New Opportunities Funding to-date in October. Of the 45 bids over half were for providers in areas of disadvantage, addressing the childcare gap has been a real focus for the team and it is hoped this bid will start to address the balance.

The different types of bids we get involved in are always varied and this time is no exception with a bid from 'Football in the Community' amongst the submissions.

Work is well under way for the February round of bids for funding with over 1500 questionnaires going out to parents in Hellesdon, Taverham, Coslany ward, Stalham, Cromer, Aylsham and Lakenham ward to find out childcare needs in each area.

Many projects are also starting to come to fruition with Barn Club and Sunflower looking to extend their services and work should start onsite in September 2003 for the Sherringham project.

Finally, recognising that the Partnership can offer help and support for older children, Earham High School Café opens its doors for children to drop in for breakfast before school starts.



## South & East Development Team

The South & East Development Team have two new workers – Peter Nash (Full-time) and Sarah Harris (Part time).

Questionnaires to parents asking about their childcare needs were sent out in the Autumn term in Wymondham, Martham and Harleston areas and these have been followed up with Public meetings to inform local people about their findings. The team have now completed this work in nearly all of the South and East area and are currently working with new childcare groups and providers to ensure the successful opening of their projects.

Another consortium bid to the New Opportunities Fund was submitted by the team in October and the team were delighted to hear that their June bid was successful and that as a result 17 new groups will open in the South & East.

The South & East Team have just celebrated their first year in their office at Havenbridge House and are pleased to report that within their first year they have helped raise nearly £700,000 for the development of childcare provision in the area and await news of a further £175,000 which has been bid for.



# Partner Focus

## NCCMA

### Two-thirds Rule to be scrapped from April 2003

Under Working Families' Tax Credit childminders can claim an approximation of expenses in calculating their income from self-employment, that is 2/3 of gross income (before expenses) is disregarded instead of making a deduction for actual expenses.

The Government is planning to introduce new tax credits from April 2003 – the Working Tax Credit and Child Tax Credit, which will replace the current system. Self-employed childminders will have to report their taxable income, i.e. their income after business expenses, so the calculation they use will be the same as that used for claiming tax credits.

### Ofsted Requirements for First Aid Courses

Newly registering childminders will need to complete a 12 hour First Aid course within 6 months of registration. Booking forms for these courses are printed in the Training News.

Childminders who are already registered will be required to complete a 12 hour First Aid course when their current First Aid Certificate runs out. This is likely to be expressed as an action on their inspection record.

### Planning Permission for Childminding

Norfolk County Childminding Association (NCCMA) is working with planning departments across the county to try to ensure that planning permission requirements are easily understood. If any childminder is having difficulty with planning permission, please contact Sarah Mutch, County Liaison Officer on 01953 499912. Sarah is compiling a dossier of cases to discuss with Planning Officers. There will be more information in NCCMA's newsletter "Between You & Me".

### Grants for Childminders

If you are starting out as a childminder or struggling to keep going because you have unfilled vacancies, ring NCCMA's County Liaison Officers for advice on Start-Up Grants or Sustainability Grants. They will talk you through your application and, if you would like, they can visit you to help you with your application for a Start-Up Grant.
