'It's about time'

Norfolk and London During the Second World War:



Your chance to take part in a video conference with a London School.

What was life like in the Second World War? The Norfolk Record Office has joined forces with Westminster Archives and the Imperial War Museum to offer children a different way to work on the QCA Unit 9 question: What was it like for a child in the Second World War?

The aim is to encourage a variety of work between partner schools in Norfolk and Westminster which will give children the opportunity to uncover how the Second World War affected people in other areas of the country as well as their own (QCA Unit 9, Section 9). The children will be able to use original material held by the archives to compare what a typical day would be like in both areas during the Second World War and find out about the lives of children evacuated from London to Norfolk.

Children will initially be asked to write a pen pal letter to a pupil at their partner school. Once contact has been made a video conference will be held in which each pupil will get the chance to talk to their pen pal face to face. There will also be a chance to work on a drama project using a story about a boy from Woolwich who is evacuated to Norfolk.

Both BBC Radio Norfolk and the Norfolk Record Office will be running a number of events throughout the day. Several exhibitions will be on display including a touring exhibition by the Norwich and Norfolk Racial Equality Council. There will also be stands run by various family history groups. If you teach history and would like to know more about what's available please come along for what we hope will be an entertaining and informative day. **The Archive Centre will be open from 11 am to 4 pm!**

The Norfolk Record Society intends to initiate an annual prize (precise form and value still to be decided) to be awarded to a Young Researcher for some kind of project involving work on original source material. We have not yet agreed on any particular age range, or age limitation, nor come to a firm view as what kind of work would be the most appropriate for the receipt of the prize, but we are particularly keen that the prize should encourage young people to get involved in archival research. We would welcome the ideas and advice of local teachers, and in particular would like to recruit one or two to join the panel setting up the scheme and subsequently to assist in adjudicating the entries. Our intention is to make the first award in 2005 at the launch event for the annual Norfolk Record Society volume, which we hope to hold at a country house in Norfolk in November and which will be attended by the society's patron, HRH the Duke of Gloucester, who may well be willing to present the first prize.
