#### National Small Schools' Week - 19th - 23rd June 2006

I am writing to remind you about the forthcoming National Small Schools' Week. This is the third such event (the first was in 2002) and will be taking place all over the country during the week beginning 19<sup>th</sup> June. The aim of the week, which is held biannually, is to raise awareness of the contribution that small primary schools make to education and to their communities.

Nationally, a number of key events are being held. For example, the annual conference of the National Small Schools Forum will take place (at Missenden Abbey) on 22<sup>nd</sup> and 23<sup>rd</sup> June. A meeting is to be held at the Houses of Parliament, hosted by Matthew Taylor MP (Lib Dem) and addressed by Deana Holdaway HMI, Professor Maurice Galton and, we hope, Fred Corbett. Further information about the week's events can be found on the NSSF website – <a href="https://www.nssf.org.uk">www.nssf.org.uk</a>. The address for applications is NSSF Conference, 23 Wymering Road, Aylesbury, Bucks .HP21 9BP.

Locally, we are encouraging all small schools to mark the event by taking some simple action which will raise their profile in their communities, and maybe beyond, and to provide a platform for celebrating their success. This is, of course, a particularly busy time of year, but the event does not have to be something extra. During the last Small Schools' Week many schools just took an event from their normal summer term calendar (for example, book fair, sports day, concert, open day) and redesignated it as a National Small Schools' Week event. Or you could invite a local dignitary to the school and seek publicity for the visit. Ideally, of course, the event should fall within the right week, but even this is not essential. The NSSF website has some examples of how small schools chose to mark the week in 2002 and 2004.

### Conference highlights

#### Speakers include:

Pie Corbett Best selling Author of 'Jumpstart' Literacy Games, The Story Maker's Chest and other publications to support teachers during the Literacy Hour. Pie will be leading one of our main sessions on 'Story Telling and Story Making in Mixed Age Classes'.

Bill Laar will be our after dinner speaker on the first night. Bill was a former school inspector in Westminster and is now an educational consultant. Bill brings a wealth of experience (and humour) from the world of education.

Christine Pfaff—formerly Head of a federation in four villages, is now an Independent Education Consultant who specialises in working with groups of schools who wish to join together in informal and formal ways, helping them to make those changes. She was awarded a Churchill Scholarship to research Leadership and Management in Sparsely Populated Areas in Europe.

This is just a taster of what is on offer at this year's NSSF Conference.

#### Workshops include:

Andrew Penman and the Five Island School—Andrew is the head a federation of five schools on the Scilly Isles. This school consists of four primaries and one secondary centre with the children boarding from the age of eleven, and transferring to the mainland for the sixth form. All of this with the added complication of water in between every building!

**Simon France and The Dunbury School**—Simon France is the head of The Dunbury School which has been a federation for twelve years. During this time it has undergone many changes, from all age sites to key stage sites, from a first school to a primary school and has now been reduced to three sites with multiple new buildings.

Estelle Smith and the Winfrith and Lulworth Schools—Estelle Smith is the head of two separate schools with children aged 4-9 on each site. The governing bodies work together, and Estelle and all of the staff work to ensure that the children work and play together on a weekly basis, and link through the curriculum.

Kate Nash with an International Perspective—Kate Nash is the headteacher of Silver Hill Primary School. She visited the Netherlands with the NCSL where the majority of schools are federated or wanting to join a federation. She has also been to New Zealand and brings an international perspective to the changes happening in England.

Sally Hughes, St James and Chackmore Church of England Schools—Sally is the substantive head of Chackmore School and, currently, Acting Head of St James, Akeley. The schools are two miles apart and were both, formerly first schools who retained Year 3 or Year 4 pupils. The Governing Body of both schools are looking to enlarge Chackmore to become a full primary school across two sites with one

school (St James') being the early years/KS1 site and Chackmore being for KS2. This arrangement is currently under formal consultation and statutory notices are due to be published soon.

**Simon East Norfolk Partnerships** Headteacher of two rural schools in Norfolk (Heavingham and Marsham). Norfolk has developed its own system of 'partnership' – neither 'Collaboration' or 'Federation' which are legal terms
