After a long and successful career in education in Scotland, the USA and England, Marie Stubbs became a household name as a result of her work at St George's Roman Catholic Secondary School in Maida Vale.

The school had been placed in special measures following the murder in 1995 of its former head teacher Philip Lawrence, and in 2000 Lady Stubbs was asked to lead the team charged with turning the school round.

In her book 'Ahead of the Class' which was recently televised by ITV, Lady Stubbs has told the story of the work at St George's and how it was finally declared 'a good school' by Ofsted.

On June 15th she will be talking about the craft of teaching and how a focus on teaching and learning was central to the success of the efforts at St George's.
