### **School Logbooks**

When the bad weather closed many schools this winter, did you stop and think that this is exactly what was happening over a century ago? If you didn't, but would like to know more, try taking a look at some school logbooks. The Norfolk Record Office holds logbooks for schools from the mid-Victorian period right up to the end of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century; books are closed for 30 years after the last entry.

The logbooks provide many interesting stories and snippets of past school life, often containing information on the running of the school, the pupils, and how lessons were taught. Major events may also be covered. The School logbook for Langham records that the school was closed in 1946 for the wedding of the then Princess Elizabeth to Lieut. Philip Mountbatten.

Logbooks can be used in a number of ways. For instance, they can be used to compare and contrast with school life today. One School who wanted to bring the information alive is looking into teaching a lesson following a Victorian lesson plan. Alternatively, the books can be used to look into more wide ranging questions, such as the pattern of disease during a certain period, or weather patterns.

The majority of logbooks held at the NRO are from closed schools, and listed under C/ED for county schools, or N/ED for Norwich schools. We do hold some log books for schools that are still open, and these are listed under D/ED.
