
Given the size of this year's Council Tax rise, anyone working for the Council might be asked why this has happened.

The following budget facts are worth bearing in mind:

- Half the 15.9% increase in the county's Council Tax demand is because £16 million in grant has been removed by the Government and redistributed to northern authorities.
- Of the total budget of £692 million, increases of nearly £50 million have been forced upon the Council by national decisions and Government policies over which we have no control.
- Public consultation, including a community discussion day held by Mori, showed people wanted key services protected, not cut.
- The 15.9% rise works out at an increase of £2.32 each week for a Band D property.

Facing the **Budget** Facts

Key features of the agreed budget include:

- £4.4 million extra each year to Social Services, including increased funding for residential homes and to avoid the need for further transfer of home care to the private sector
 - An extra £2.5 million for Education, which received a below-average Government grant settlement
 - £445,000 to support a 20% increase in library opening hours. The closure of Bradwell and Lazar House libraries was confirmed, but closure options for three others were dropped.
 - A museum 'mothballing' option was also dropped, and the immediate future assured for the West Runton Elephant Project, the Norfolk Biological Record and the Museums Exhibitions Officer post.

NPS (Property Consultancy) Ltd - a private company wholly owned by Norfolk County Council - is celebrating after winning two prestige contracts with local authorities in London and Luton together worth £2 million a year.

NPS, which has a turnover of £13 million a year and which employs more than 300 staff, will open offices in both Luton and Kingston as a result of winning the contracts.

Expert technical support will be provided from the NPS head office at County Hall.

It will take the number of NPS offices in the South and East to 10 and Managing Director, Mike Britch, says the company is well placed to win further contracts in the future.

He said: "Both these contracts were won in open

competition and I am delighted that we were able to prove to both Authorities that we could deliver a first class service at a reasonable cost to the taxpayer.

"Much of the profit we make is ploughed back to the County Council to help fund services such as education and social services, so our success is good news for council taxpayers in Norfolk ."

A share of any profits flows back to the Authority in the form of 'dividends' although NPS is able to retain what it needs to grow.

NPS is chaired by our Chief Executive, Tim Byles, with a two senior officers and a county councillor making up the other board members.

Norfolk County Council -**Size Matters!**

The Electoral Commission's Boundary Committee for England will be carrying out a review of Norfolk County Council's divisional boundaries this year. The Council is currently reaching a view on whether there needs to be a change in the number of elected members there are currently 84.

Once this has been done, the Council will prepare detailed draft proposals for how the divisional boundaries could look, for submission to the Committee.

Any groups who submit their own proposals to the Boundary Committee are asked to copy their suggestions to the County Council, so that they can be put on public display. The Council aims to have its draft proposals prepared by early April. There will then be widespread consultation which will run until May 9. The Council will pass its submission to the Boundary Committee following a full Council meeting on 7th July after which the Committee will carry out its own consultation process.

UK Youth Parliament Elections 2003

The 2003 election for Norfolk's representatives on the UK Youth Parliament saw 7,172 votes cast for the 22 candidates - a 59% increase in voting compared to last year (4,501). The election took place during the week 20th Jan to 23rd Jan, and 44 young people - 16 more than last year - put themselves forward as candidates. The number of candidates was reduced to 22 through a hustings day, where each candidate made a speech and then a vote was taken to find the final short list to appear on each ballot paper. 28 schools and colleges acted as polling stations, on increase of 8 on 2002. 16,500 ballot papers were issued, therefore the turnout was 44%.

The following were elected as members of the UK Youth Parliam

- North Norfolk (North Norfolk Constituency) - Adam Blyth (North Walsham High)
- South East Norfolk (South Norfolk Constituency) - Daniel Boast (Long Stratton High)
- West Norfolk (West Norfolk Constituer James Miller (King Edward VI, K.Lynr
- Central Norfolk (Norwich South Constituency) - Sarah Reynolds (Norwich School)

All members will provide a direct link for Members of Parliament to the UK Youth Parliament. The elections were organised by Norfolk County Council, and Council Leader Alison King was delighted with the upsurge in interest among young people. "A healthy democracy needs active citizens, so this is a very good sign for the future. I am sure that the successful candidates will find it fascinating. Perhaps it will inspire some of them to go into politics in later life - I certainly hope so."

The question of photography and video recording of children in schools continues to vex head teachers and others who produce printed or web material.

Last summer our 'Safe Use of Images' guidelines for schools and others were produced to cover photography or recording for publication - anything from a Year R photo in the local newspaper to the school's own leaflets and website. Since then, the guestion of whether parents should be allowed to photograph or video record school events, such as gymnastic displays or school nativity plays, has emerged as another issue.

Our guidelines are therefore being revised to take account of this, and to pick up suggestions made. Once complete, *.Hortolk.gov.uk the intention is to distribute the guidelines to all schools. Avision of the future

Imagine Norfolk in 2023. What is our economic, social and environmental future and what do we want it to be? Their job was to draw together aspirations for the future of Norfolk, helping to produce the county's first Community Strategy which will be published by the end of March before going out for wider consultation to be refined and adapted over the coming months.

Low income, deteriorating capital, falling commodity pricesthe future for our farms and rural business appears a bleak one.

But the overriding message emerging from this community is that farmers are not merely sitting back and letting themselves be overtaken by events - they are keen to hone their existing businesses and derive income from new sources.

This point was driven home on Friday 31 January when over 120 delegates braved difficult driving conditions to attend the 'Shaping the Future' Food and Agriculture Conference at Easton College, organised by our Economic Development Team

The conference also attracted some forty delegates from Norway on a week-long trade mission to Norfolk as part of Norway Week.

The delegates spanned the rural business sector with small producers and larger farming businesses networking with producers and retailers to find new ways to boost business. Feedback from attendees was very positive.

Workshops addressed issues such as diversification, access to grants, funding and support and food safety, demonstrating how new ideas can be brought to fruition.

Delegates went away with a common message from all speakers to find a way of not just coping with change but to exploit and enjoy it:


