

The Festival of Britain 1951

Last term, a small group of students from Paston College visited the NRO to

learn more about The Festival of Britain as experienced by people in Norfolk. In order to gauge the festival spirit, the group studied a range of primary and secondary source material. This included the City of Norwich Plan 1945 (for post-war development); The Book of The Norwich Festival 1951; and a booklet about an 'experiment in civic design' - a project of the late 1950s to improve Magdalen Street in Norwich. An album of newspaper cuttings about the floods of 1953 provided a helpful reminder of less positive experiences at this time. If you're not sure whether the NRO could enhance your syllabus, please don't hesitate to ask!





The Tudors

This pack sheds light on Tudor Norfolk, especially on the differences between the lives of rich and poor people. It contains a selection of reproduced documents, in colour and laminated, with accompanying notes for teachers. All written sources are provided in transcript and some are also presented in their original hand. And just why was it necessary to carry a small white wand before you on the streets of Norwich in the days before Harry Potter? All is revealed in the pack!



It's about time is bigger this issue. We need to tell you more than a double-sided sheet of A4 would allow. BUT we are conscious of your pleas from the outset for minimal paper, so we'll try not to make a habit of this!

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Local History Packs



Local History Packs are produced in partnership with the Norfolk Heritage Centre and contain approximately sixteen reproduced documents which reflect the history of a school's local area (circa 1840s - 1940s). They include any or all of the following (depending on availability) in part or in whole: trade directories, maps, census returns, parish register burial entries, school log books, sales particulars, probate inventories and photographs. It's intended that they serve as a springboard from which pupils can learn about their immediate environment. They link in particularly well with the QCA Study Units 12, 'How did life change in our locality in Victorian times?' and 18, 'What was it like to live here in the past?'

As agreed with members of the schools' working group last term, a resource pack on the QCA Study Unit 'Homes' will be ready for the start of next term.


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The story so far ...
