Top Tips from Tim Lomas on 'understanding historical situations, events and people' :

- 1. Using the senses what people heard, felt, smelt rather than saw
- 2. Visualisation
- 3. Using pictures to stimulate responses
- 4. Freeze frames
- 5. Children in the past (easier to relate to) and especially linked to their own history
- 6. Children devise questions with hot seating respondees
- 7. Getting pupils to represent different people in a story
- 8. Biographies, character sketches and obituaries
- 9. Choosing a favourite person and discuss what was good or bad about them
- 10. Find deliberate mistakes in history
- 11. Precis/summaries of the most important parts of a story or theme
- 12. Thinking /mind maps ;inking events
- 13. outlines of a broad theme
- 14. comparing themes and issues across units
- 15. acting as advisers/spies in a historical situation
- 16. highlighting particular parts of a story or source e.g. to show a viewpoint or something significant
- 17. imagining being in a particular place at an 4event in a room describing the scene

Do you have any interesting projects you can share? Here are details of two projects that are ongoing in the county

Activexpression Pilot – July 2008

Northgate, Neatherd and Hethersett high schools were recently involved in a county pilot testing a new piece of Promethean software called Activexpression.

Activexpression is a new type of pupil response handset. It is a vast improvement on activote – containing many more functions. Pupils can text a response, order answers chronologically as well as importance, and question wizard makes preparation quick and easy.

These interactive response handsets proved a great hit with all involved. The focus of the scheme was to critically evaluate the uses of expression within the lesson to promote pupil motivation, engagement and AFL.

Pupils thoroughly enjoyed using them. It was great to be able to involve every pupil in every question and to share so many responses/ ideas at once. Pupils really could see their thinking develop over the lesson.

For staff the benefits were also many. The word seed function provided a great starting point to discussion. Furthermore, the ability to monitor who answered what and then to send the results to excel enabled easy tracking and could certainly cut down on paper!

Activexpression will soon be made more widely available with training events running in the pilot schools in the autumn term 2008.

Global Lounge

Johannes Ahrenfelt at Neatherd has set up a new project called 'Global Lounge' at Neatherd High School. This is an online environment where schools can meet, discuss, plan and accomplish innovative and exiting international projects. The aims of Global-Lounge.org are: to make international links easier to plan, organize and run; provide ideas and information for schools seeking to establish new links; encourage students to share work and ideas; develop a wider understanding of different forms of diversity. The 3 projects up and running include a History Comenius Project examining significant events and individuals of the 1950s & 1960s (pending funding); a Holocaust Memorial project; and another Comenius scheme which focuses on minorities (pending funding).

Their Past Your Future 2 Conferences at IWM Duxford on November 4th & 25th .

This is aimed at history teachers at KS3 and above in the local area. The conferences are free and fully catered. Each will be introduced by Samantha Heywood, Director of TPYF2, and delegates will have the opportunity to attend 2 practical workshops looking at how to set up and run an intergenerational learning project in school. The days will close with a speech from Dale Banham, Humanities Adviser in Suffolk, who will demonstrate to teachers how such projects directly relate to the revised curriculum. Teachers will have the opportunity to meet staff from regional museums and archives who are interested in working with schools and veterans of conflict from both the Second World War and post-1945 conflicts. Teachers will be given free resources to use in schools.
