Update 6: September 2008

The SEN Strategy will improve the range of specialist provision across Norfolk for children and young people. In future all special schools will be called **complex needs schools** and provide for children and young people aged 2-19 years. The Strategy will also increase the number of specialist units in mainstream schools to 59 **specialist resource bases** and each will have an area of specialism.

What has happened recently?

The results of our feasibility studies were considered by county councillors at the following meetings:



- 18th July 08 Children's Services Review Panel
- 29th July 08 Cabinet Scrutiny
- 11th August Cabinet

The Cabinet outcome was that the recommendations of the SEN Strategy report were agreed. In particular, agreement included:

- 59 Specialist Resource Bases and 13 Complex Needs School locations.
- Specialist Resource Bases will be set up over a 2 year period beginning in September 08.
- Change of designation process for the current special schools to become complex needs schools will begin from September 2008 for an anticipated start date of September 2009.

What the SEN Strategy Team will be involved in next...

- Specialist Resource Bases
 - Establish specialisms & service level agreements with schools
 - Roll out staff training
 - Prioritise each Specialist Resource Base building works /open date
- Development of Human Resources Strategy for Specialist Resource Bases & Complex Needs Schools
- Complex Needs Schools
 - Establish specialisms
 - Plan training & development for staff
 - Plan improvements to residential provision
 - Create links with Specialist Resource Bases
- Analysis of Complex Special Educational Needs Incidence to be reported to Children's Services Review Panel in January 2009

The change from the current moderate learning difficulty (MLD) and severe learning difficulty (SLD) special schools to Complex Needs Schools will be a slow and carefully managed process to ensure that the already high standard of our special schools is maintained and continues to improve. Therefore, the change of designation in September 2009 will not mean that special schools change immediately.





Churchill Park Complex Needs School

The Alderman Jackson and Ethel Tipple Special Schools in King's Lynn will combine to become Churchill Park Complex Needs School, opening in September 2009. The new school building is a phased development currently being built on the existing Ethel Tipple School site.

Our thanks to all the children and staff who have coped very well during the construction so far. Recruitment of a Headteacher for the new school is underway.
