

Things to think about...

Can you show how your pupils have used their imaginations and problem solving techniques to support sustainable development? The Awards are a wonderful opportunity to highlight your school community's work and inspire others.

The categories align with the new DfES Sustainable Schools Framework (www.teachernet. gov.uk/sustainableschools) and promote sustainability not as an 'added extra' but as a core for whole school improvement.









Award Categories

There are 10 categories plus an overall winner and you could win up to £1,000 for your school. We are keen to hear about the process as well as the end result and to celebrate ideas as well as action.

Local Well-Being

Have you extended your thinking in school so that a **'positive contribution'** to the local community is being made?

You may have been innovative about enhancing the local environment and preventing the depletion of natural resources or involved people in the wider community when making decisions. Pupils may have adopted a local allotment or your school may be a hub for the local community.

Food and Drink

Are you supporting all pupils to **'be healthy'**? Are you working with your catering provider to encourage them to use locally produced, low-chemical, seasonal or fairly traded products?

Some schools may have healthy tuck shops or sell their own produce from school gardens. Your pupils may even be improving their persuasive writing skills by lobbying suppliers!

Energy and Water

Is your school community trying to reduce its energy and water consumption? Pupils may monitor how much gas/oil/electricity is used in school and reduce this by promoting energy efficiency measures. Maybe you've reduced CO₂ emissions by using solar or wind energy.





Travel and Traffic

Have you thought about how to ensure your pupils 'stay safe' on their journey to school? Pupils may have undertaken travel surveys, started walking or cycling to school, set up car share schemes or started campaigns to get more people to use the school bus rather than being driven to school? Your school council might be running an incentive scheme to reward pupils and staff who walk and cycle to school, or produced leaflets and posters to encourage people to think about the way they travel.

Purchasing

Is your school really thinking about what you buy, where it comes from and who made it? You may have decided to buy recycled products, refused to buy overly packaged items or decided to use local suppliers. Your pupils could be at the centre of this decision-making process in school.

Waste

Are your pupils actively reducing waste? You may have worked with 'SWAC' or have an efficient system for collecting compostables so you can nourish your growing area? There may be an ethos of 'make do and mend' rather than buying new. Your pupils may be monitoring waste production and using ICT and numeracy skills to share this data.

Grounds

Are your pupils **'enjoying and achieving'** by undertaking their literacy and numeracy in the outdoor classroom? You may have a regular 'Forest School' where the youngest children develop their confidence and self-esteem through outdoor play. Perhaps you have designed and built a structure where outdoor lessons can take place or taken a whole school approach to developing your grounds.





Global Dimension

Has your school realised that they are part of a diverse global community which offers endless opportunities for **'enjoying and achieving'**? Perhaps your pupils share information with overseas schools so that issues can be investigated on a global scale, for example sharing weather data in geography or having a joint dialogue about food as part of literacy. Your pupils will be able to connect their own lives to lives of people in distant lands. Your school will actively challenge stereotypes and celebrate diversity within its own locality.

Inclusion and Participation

Are you making sure **all** young people in your school are participating in a diverse range of 'learning outside the classroom' activities? Pupils may be learning about democracy and decision-making with a focus on sustainability in PHSE and Citizenship or have an effective school council or eco-committee who make sure that all children's points of view are considered.

Buildings

Have you considered **'economic well-being'** from a buildings perspective? You may have thought carefully about how healthy your building is and made efforts to improve it. Perhaps you are a school that is soon to have a new build and your pupils have fully participated in the design process.
